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Enrolled Minutes of the Fifteenth Regular or Special Meeting For the Twenty-Ninth Highland Town Council Regular Plenary Business Meeting (Electronic) Monday, July 27, 2020

The Twenty-Ninth Town Council of the Town of Highland, Lake County, Indiana met in its regular plenary session on Monday, July 27, 2020 at 6:31 O'clock P.M. in the regular place, the Highland Municipal Building, 3333 Ridge Road, Highland, Indiana.

This meeting was convened as an *electronic meeting*, pursuant to Governor Holcomb's Executive Order 20-04 and 20-09 allowing such meetings pursuant to IC 5-14-1.5-3.6 for the duration of the COVID-19 public health emergency, extended by Executive Order No. 20-30. All persons were meeting remotely on a Zoom platform that allowed for real time interaction, and supported the public's ability to observe and record the proceedings. When the agenda item provided for public comment, this was supported as well. Councilor Herak, while not required under the Governor's orders, was present on the premises of the plenary meeting room.

Pursuant to HMC Section 2.05.130(A)(2), the Town Council considered and reviewed the agenda in an informal proceeding. Once completed the Town Council moved to the full plenary meeting.

The Town Council President, Mark J. Schocke presided. The Town Clerk-Treasurer, Michael W. Griffin, was present to memorialize the proceedings. The meeting was opened with Council President Schocke offering a prayer reciting the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

**Roll Call** Present on roll call were Councilors Bernie Zemen, Mark Herak, Mark J. Schocke, Thomas Black and Roger Sheeman. The Clerk-Treasurer, Michael W. Griffin was present to memorialize the proceedings. A quorum was attained. All participated electronically.

Additional Officials Present: (all electronically) Scott Bilse, Attorney; John P. Reed, Town Attorney; Mark Knesek, Public Works Director; Pete Hojnicki, Police Chief; William R. Timmer, Jr., CFOD, Fire Chief; Alex M. Brown, CPRP, Parks and Recreation Superintendent; Kathy DeGuilio-Fox, Redevelopment Director; and Kenneth J. Mika, Building Commissioner were present.

Also present: Larry Kondrat (electronically) of the Board of Waterworks Directors; and Ed Dabrowski IT (Contract) Director (electronically) were also present.

*Guests*: Theresa Badovich of the Idea Factory was also present electronically.

**Minutes of the Previous Meeting:** Councilor Zemen moved the approval of the minutes of the regular plenary meeting of July 13, 2020. Councilor Black seconded, upon a roll call vote, there were five affirmatives and no negatives. The motion passed. The minutes were approved.

#### **Comments from Visitors or Residents:**

- 1. Larry Kondrat, Highland, expressed opposition to Resolution No. 2020-36, a resolution for which Councilor Herak filed and gave notice of his intention to take up at this meeting.
- 2. Terry Steagall, Highland, sought clarification regarding Resolution No. 2020-36. The Town Council President stated that the Resolution is not on the agenda.

There were no further public comments.

# HIGHLAND 2020 CENSUS COMPLETE COUNT COMMITTEE Town Council Staff Report- July 27th Meeting

Current activities include the following: Sodal media posts and "Shares" by other Department's social media outlets; Census flyers being distributed through the Highland Library; and, future message on August water bill and Census content in August's Gazebo Express.

A final reminder from the Census Bureau for those households that have not self-responded to the 2020 Census, is being mailed out between July 22<sup>nd</sup> & 28<sup>th</sup>. Highland residents who receive this notice are strongly encouraged to respond immediately to the Census. The US Census Bureau has moved up the date to this Thursday (July 30<sup>th</sup>) to begin their <u>in-person</u> visits to Lake County households that have not responded. To avoid an in-person visit, Highland residents should self-respond immediately, if they have not already done so.

Residents have three ways to self-respond to the Census: they can go to my2020census.gov to respond online; respond by phone may call 844-330-2020; and, residents who have not already responded can fill out and mall in paper questionnaires.

Highland residents should be aware, as it pertains to Census in-house visits, of the following:

- The visits are being conducted by US Census Bureau personnel, NOT the Town of Highland
- Census personnel will be wearing masks and other necessary PPE and will be trained in proper COVID-19 safety protocols.
- They will have a valid ID badge with their photograph, a U.S. Department of Commerce watermark, and an expiration date and they may also carry Census Bureau bags and other equipment with the Census Bureau logo.
- If no one is home when the census taker visits, the census taker will leave a notice of their visit with information about how to respond online, by phone or by mail.
- If the census taker who visits your home does not speak your language, you may request a return visit from a census taker who does speak your language.
- Highland residents are required by federal law to participate in the Census.

As of statistics obtained today (July 23rd), a 2010/ 2020 comparison of self-response rates to date, shows as follows:

Entire Town- 2010 Final Self-Response Rate- 80.6 % 2020 To Date- 78.3%

#405.01- 2010 Final Self-Response Rate - 74.4% 2020 To Date- 64.9%

#405.02-2010 Final Self-Response Rate - 80.5% 2020 To Date- 78.1

#406- 2010 Final Self-Response Rate - 77.3% 2020 To Date- 77.7%


#407- 2010 Final Self-Response Rate - 83.7% 2020 To Date- 84.3%

#408.01- 2010 Final Self-Response Rate - 84.2% 2020 To Date- 83.9%

To date, in two of Highland's six Census Tracts (#406 & #407), we have exceeded the 2010 Final self-response rate for those tracts. In two other tracts (#408.01 & #408.2), we are 0.3% and 0.4% away respectively, from matching 2010.

1. **Introduced Ordinance No. 1717:** An Ordinance to Establish and Control the Use of Ceremonial and Honorific Banners on the Town of Highland Property Specifically for the Used Described in the Ordinance. *Councilor Herak introduced and filed Ordinance No.* 1717, at the Town Council meeting of June 08, 2020. The introduced ordinance was reviewed and marked up at study sessions of June 15, 2020 and July 06, 2020.

Councilor Herak moved the passage and adoption of Ordinance No. 1717. Councilor Black seconded. Upon a roll call vote, there were five affirmatives and no negatives. The motion passed. The ordinance was adopted.

#### Ordinance No. 1717 of the TOWN of HIGHLAND, INDIANA

# AN ORDINANCE to ESTABLISH AND CONTROL THE USE OF CEREMONIAL AND HONORIFIC BANNERS ON TOWN OF HIGHLAND PROPERTY SPECIFICALLY DESIGNED FOR THE USES AS DESCRIBED HEREIN and AMEND THE HIGHLAND MUNICIPAL CODE BY THE ADDITION OF A NEW

CHAPTER 8.30.

WHEREAS, Over the most recent years last past, the Town of Highland has installed hardware to facilitate the attachment of Ceremonial and Honorific Banners to Town of Highland property, consisting primarily of

WHEREAS, The Town Council has recognized that multiple parties representing different groups, including the Town of Highland Schools and military servicemen and women, including veterans, and are interested in producing honorific banners recognizing individuals and their achievements;

WHEREAS, The Town Council further determines that the Town of Highland will not, in any way, profit or inure any benefit from any fee that may be imposed for the placement of the aforesaid banners beyond the recovery of costs associated placing the honorific and ceremonial banners on the prepared light poles and the care and maintenance associated with readying and preserving the light poles that will accept the aforesaid banners;

WHEREAS, IC 36-10-2-4, expressly confers powers upon the Town to establish, aid, maintain, and operate cultural programs;

WHEREAS, It is the intent of the Town Council to provide a program that will elevate the cultural life of the community, promote civic pride, foster positive activity in the redevelopment and economic development areas of the Town and enhance the visual appeal of the sites lines in the commercial area of the downtown;

WHEREAS, The Town Council further determines that the Town of Highland will benefit from a program using certain of the light poles with banner attachments, at certain times of year, to announce and inform the citizens of celebrations, matters of civic pride, or other community activities; and,

WHEREAS, The Town Council hereby declares that the light poles with banner hardware shall not be used for general commercial, political, informative, or other forms of advertising to generate any level or profit or inurement above actual costs and expenses incurred by the Town of Highland,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED BY the Town Council of the Town of Highland, Lake County, Indiana, as follows:

**Section 1.** That the Highland Municipal Code be hereby amended by the addition of a new chapter, styled as Chapter 8.30, to be called Light Post Semaphores, Banners, and Displays, which shall read as follows:

#### Chapter 8.30 Light Post Semaphores, Banners, and Displays

#### 8.30.010 Honorific Display and Celebrations.

Light posts owned by the Town of Highland through its executive departments, possessing hardware supporting the display of semaphores, banners and similar displays, will be available for use by certain individuals or groups as according to the terms of this chapter (display service).

#### 8.30.020 Posts Enrolled in the Display Service

- (A) The light posts available for this service are those located in the downtown section of the town, erected along the 2800-2900 blocks of Jewett Street and Highway Avenues.
- (B) Subject to the approval of the Park and Recreation Board, light posts located in Main Square Park may be available for the display service.
- (C) The Town of Highland through its public works department reserves the right to assign the poles according to the Town's requirements or exigencies.

#### 8.30.030 Preferred Users

attachments to various light poles;

(A) The Town of Highland designates and identifies certain users or groups as participants in the display program, which subject to the scheduling requirements of the Town, will be given special access to the display service without charge.

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- (B) School Town of Highland and School Town of Highland Support Groups will be a designated preferred user. The School Town of Highland, and the various groups that support the Town of Highland Schools, shall be permitted to utilize the light pole banner locations for honoring students and student- athletes as follows:
  - (1). During the Fall Term of the School Year, at least Seventy-Five (75) a substantial number of the banner-equipped light poles will be dedicated to exclusive use by the School Town of Highland and the various groups that support the Town of Highland Schools.
  - (2). During the Spring Term of the School Year, at least Fifty (50) a substantial number of the banner-equipped light poles will be dedicated to exclusive use by the School Town of Highland and the various groups that support the Town of Highland Schools.
  - (3). Groups supporting the Town of Highland Schools shall be approved by the School Town of Highland.
- (C) United States and Indiana Military and Groups supporting the Military and Veterans Affairs will be a designed preferred user. The Military, comprised of all branches of the armed forces of the United States of America, and the various groups that support the Military, shall be permitted to utilize the light pole banner locations for honoring active members of the Military, veterans, and those missing in action and killed in action, as follows:
  - (1). During the period immediately following the Spring Term and prior to the Fall Term of the School Year, all **but a specified number thirty** (30) of the Town of Highland light pole banner locations shall be used by the Military, veterans, and those missing in action and killed in action.
  - (2). The remaining banner-equipped light poles shall be utilized by the Town of Highland and its affiliated entities for governmental other lawful purposes.

#### 8.30.040 Logistics and Miscellaneous.

- (A) Honorific and Ceremonial Banners shall only be affixed or removed to the banner-equipped light poles by employees, contractors, and agents of the Town of Highland.
- (B) The Town of Highland may impose a fee for the installation and maintenance of the Honorific and Ceremonial Banners. Said fee, if imposed, shall not exceed the actual cost of the banner installation, removal and maintenance.
- (C) Maintenance of the banners does not include maintaining the quality or characteristics of the banners, but, rather, includes only the care and maintenance of the light poles and the hardware necessary to affix the banners.
- (D) Sponsors of the Ceremonial and Honorific Banners may have the sponsorship acknowledged on the banners, themselves. However, said acknowledgment shall not comprise more than Twenty Percent (20%) of the banner's overall size.
- (E) The display service is a demonstration and nascent program the operation of which the object of which in part is to further inform policy and refine its design and operation. The display service will be reviewed from time to time to further refine and perfect its design and operation.
- (F) While the display program is in its nascent phase, informing the Town Council regarding the ways and means of its operation, informing its understanding to later refine this chapter, Councilor Mark Herak shall serve as the contact and coordinating person for the program.
  - Section 2. That all provisions of ordinances in conflict with the provisions hereof are hereby repealed;
- Section 3. That this ordinance shall become and be in full force and effect from and after its adoption, passage and until its subsequent amendment or repeal by proper ordinance, all pursuant to IC 36-5-2-10(c).

Introduced and Filed on 8<sup>th</sup> day of June 2020. Consideration on same day or at same meeting of introduction was not considered, pursuant to IC 36-5-2-9.8.

#### ORDINANCE No. 1718.1691-C of the TOWN of HIGHLAND, INDIANA

AN ORDINANCE to AMEND ORDINANCE No. 1691 FIXING THE WAGE and SALARY RATES of the ELECTED OFFICERS, the NON-ELECTED OFFICERS, and the EMPLOYEES of the TOWN of HIGHLAND, INDIANA PARTICULARLY AMENDING PAY ASSOCIATED WITH A NEW POSITION in the PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT (AGENCY) and MAKING RELATED AMENDMENTS TO THE COMPENSATION AND BENEFITS ORDINANCE

- WHEREAS, Title 36, Article 1 Chapter 4 of the Indiana Code confers certain general corporate powers on the several units of government in Indiana;
- WHEREAS, Section fifteen of that chapter specifically provides that a unit of government may fix the level of compensation of its officers and employees; and
- WHEREAS, I.C. 36-5-3-2 further provides in pertinent part that the town legislative body shall provide reasonable compensation for the other town officers and employees;
- WHEREAS, I.C. 36-5-3-2(b), still further provides that the Town Legislative body shall, by ordinance fix the compensation of its own members and the Town Clerk-Treasurer;
- WHEREAS, I.C. 36-5-3-2(c) still further provides that the compensation of an elected town officer may not be changed in the year for which it is fixed, nor may it be reduced below the amount fixed for the previous year;
- WHEREAS, The Town Council of the Town of Highland, as the town legislative body, now desires to amend the ordinance that was adopted to fix the compensation of its elected officers, appointed officers and employees of the Town for the year 2019 and thereafter as amended;
- WHEREAS, The Town Council of the Town of Highland, as the town legislative body, has been advised that it is desirable to establish a new position and fix an hourly rate for the position based upon the needs of the department and the current work of the department secretary; and,
- WHEREAS, The Town Council of the Town of Highland, as the town legislative body, now desires to establish a new position and fix an hourly rate for the position based upon the needs of the public works department (agency) and the current work of the department secretary for the year ensuing and thereafter,
- **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED** by the Town Council of the Town of Highland, Lake County, Indiana, that the Wages, Salaries, and special detail levels of the Officers and Employees of the Town of Highland, are hereby established and fixed, pursuant to the provisions indicated herein and as follows:
- **Section 1.** That Section 9 subdivision (B) of Ordinance No. 1691 as amended be further amended by repealing it in its entirety and replacing with a successor subdivision, to be styled as Section 8 subdivision (B) which shall read as follows:
  - **Section 9.** Public Works Department (Agency). That subject to the provisions of this ordinance, the salary and wages for the non-elected officers and employees of the Town of Highland are hereby fixed for its **Public Works Department** as follows:

### Town Council Staff Report- August 10th Meeting

Current activities include the following: Social media posts and "Shares" by other Department's social media outlets; Census flyers being distributed through the Highland Library; and, message on August water bill and Census content in August's Gazebo Express.

The US Census Bureau has begun their in-person visits to Lake County households that have not responded. To avoid an in-person visit, Highland residents should self-respond immediately, if they have not already done so by going to 2020census.gov to respond online; respond by phone by calling 844-330-2020; and, residents who have not already responded can fill out and mail in paper questionnaires.

Highland residents should be aware, as it pertains to Census in-house visits, of the following:

- The visits are being conducted by US Census Bureau personnel, NOT the Town of Highland.
- Census personnel will be wearing masks and other necessary PPE and will be trained in proper COVID-19 safety protocols.
- They will have a valid ID badge with their photograph, a U.S. Department of Commerce watermark, and an expiration date and they may also carry Census Bureau bags and other equipment with the Census Bureau logo.
- If no one is home when the census taker visits, the census taker will leave a notice of their visit with information about how to respond online, by phone or by mail.
- If the census taker who visits your home does not speak your language, you may request a return visit from a census taker who does speak your language.
- Highland residents are required by federal law to participate in the Census.

Also, this week the Census Bureau announced that it will be concluding response gathering one month earlier than previously announced. In-person visits and self-responses will now end on September 30<sup>th</sup>, rather than October 31<sup>st</sup> as previously scheduled. With much of the country under their 2010 self-response rate levels due to COVID-19, moving up the end date by a month, has the potential for significant under counts to be locked in for the next ten years.

As for Highland's self-response rate, the Bureau's final mailing and publicity surrounding the beginning of in-person visits, has resulted in an uptick in Highland's self-response rate to date. Currently, we are outperforming 2010 self-response rates in four of Highland's six census tracts. In addition, a fifth census tract is within less than 1 % of its 2010 level, and the response rate for the town as a whole is 1.1% from 2010.

As of statistics obtained today (August 7th), a 2010/ 2020 comparison of self-response rates to date, shows as follows:

Entire Town- 2010 Final Self-Response Rate- 80.6 % 2020 To Date- 79.5% (-1.1%)

#405.01- 2010 Final Self-Response Rate - 74.4% 2020 To Date- 65.7% (-8.7%)

#405.02- 2010 Final Self-Response Rate - 80.5% 2020 To Date- 79.9% (-0.6%)

#406- 2010 Final Self-Response Rate - 77.3% 2020 To Date- 78.9% (+1.6%)

#407- 2010 Final Self-Response Rate - 83.7% 2020 To Date- 85.3% (+1.6%)


#408.01- 2010 Final Self-Response Rate - 84.2% 2020 To Date- 85.2% (+1.0%)

#408.02- 2010 Final Self-Response Rate - 83.7% 2020 To Date- 84.5% (+0.8%)

The census tract map included shows the two remaining census tracts, #405.01 and 405.02, that have not outperformed their 2010 self-response rate.

As of today, Highland's response rate is currently tied for 22nd best, out Indiana's 566 cities and towns. Indiana is currently tied for 11th best in the country.

## ORDINANCE No. 1719.1691-D of the TOWN of HIGHLAND, INDIANA

AN ORDINANCE to AMEND ORDINANCE No. 1691 FIXING THE WAGE and SALARY RATES of the ELECTED OFFICERS, the NON-ELECTED OFFICERS, and the EMPLOYEES of the TOWN of HIGHLAND, INDIANA PARTICULARLY AMENDING PAY ASSOCIATED WITH THE ASSISTANT INSPECTOR FOR PLUMBING POSITION in the BUILDING AND INSPECTION DEPARTMENT and MAKING RELATED AMENDMENTS TO THE CHAPTER 15.20 of the HIGHLAND MUNICIPAL CODE

- WHEREAS, Title 36, Article 1 Chapter 4 of the Indiana Code confers certain general corporate powers on the several units of government in Indiana;
- WHEREAS, Section fifteen of that chapter specifically provides that a unit of government may fix the level of compensation of its officers and employees; and
- WHEREAS, I.C. 36-5-3-2 further provides in pertinent part that the town legislative body shall provide reasonable compensation for the other town officers and employees;
- **WHEREAS,** I.C. 36-5-3-2(b), still further provides that the Town Legislative body shall, by ordinance fix the compensation of its own members and the Town Clerk-Treasurer;
- WHEREAS, I.C. 36-5-3-2(c) still further provides that the compensation of an elected town officer may not be changed in the year for which it is fixed, nor may it be reduced below the amount fixed for the previous year;
- WHEREAS, The Town Council of the Town of Highland, as the town legislative body, now desires to amend the ordinance that was adopted to fix the compensation of its elected officers, appointed officers and employees of the Town for the year 2019 and thereafter as amended;
- WHEREAS, The Town Council of the Town of Highland, as the town legislative body, has been advised that it is desirable to make certain amendments to align language in HMC Section 15.20.020(G) regarding compensation of the Assistant Inspector for Plumbing and Section 8(B)(4) of the Wage and Salary Ordinance; and,
- WHEREAS, The Town Council of the Town of Highland, as the town legislative body, now desires to make certain amendments to align language in HMC Section 15.20.020(G) regarding compensation of the Assistant Inspector for Plumbing and Section 8(B)(4) of the Wage and Salary Ordinance for the year ensuing and thereafter,
- **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED** by the Town Council of the Town of Highland, Lake County, Indiana, that the Wages, Salaries, and special detail levels of the Officers and Employees of the Town of Highland, are hereby established and fixed, pursuant to the provisions indicated herein and as follows:

**Section 1.** That Section 8 subdivision (B) (4) of Ordinance No. 1691 as amended be further amended by repealing it in its entirety and replacing with a successor subdivision, to be styled as Section 8 subdivision (B)(4) which shall read as follows:

**Section 8.** Building and Inspection Department. That subject to the provisions of this ordinance, the salary and wages for the non-elected officers and employees of the Town of Highland are hereby fixed for its Building and Inspection Department as follows:

(B) (4) Assistant Inspector for Plumbing (part-time)

\$17.00 For each one-unit plumbing examination proctored, pay unit rate as fixed pursuant to as provided in § Section 15.20.020 (G)(1), and thus hereby amended.

\$24.00 For each inspection performed pay a rate as fixed pursuant to as described in Section 15.20.020 (G)(2) of the Highland Municipal Code, and thus hereby amended.

**Section 2.** That Section 15.20.020 subdivision (G) be amended by repealing it in its entirety and replacing with a successor subdivision, to be styled as 15.20.020 subdivision (G), which shall read as follows:

(G) The assistant inspector for plumbing shall receive no annual salary but shall be compensated according to the following schedule:

- (2) For each inspection performed which includes the following:

  - (d) Sewer tap inspection: \$24.75 each.
  - (e) Water tap inspection: \$24.75 each.
  - (f) Re-inspections in consequence of red tagging: \$24.75 each.

## Fee and Payment Schedule

(Effective July 1, 2020)

- (1) For each one-unit plumbing examination proctored as provided in HMC 15.20.100: \$18.00.
- (2) For each inspection performed which includes the following:
  - (a) Rough inspection: \$25.50 each.
  - (b) Final inspection: \$25.50 each.
  - (c) Underground: \$25.50 each.

(d) Sewer tap inspection: \$25.50 each. (e) Water tap inspection: \$25.50 each.

(f) Re-inspections in consequence of red tagging: \$25.50 each.

**Section 3.** That Section 2.01 styled as Exempt Employees in the Compensation and Benefits Ordinance commonly called the municipal employee handbook, be further amended to read as follows:

§ 2.01 Exempt Employees

Exempt employees refers to workers who are exempt from certain provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act pertaining to overtime. It also means that you are in a supervisory or professional position as further defined in 29 CFR 541.200 et seq., and not eligible for overtime payments for work in excess of 40 hours per week, except as provided by this handbook.

# TOWN OF HIGHLAND ENACTMENT NO. 2020-40

A SPECIAL ENACTMENT TO LAWFULLY SUSPEND A PROVISION OF THE CURRENT COMPENSATION AND BENEFITS ORDINANCE COMMONLY KNOWN AS THE EMPLOYEE HANDBOOK AS WELL AS A PROVISION IN THE WAGE AND SALARY ORDINANCE AND AUTHORIZE THE PROMOTION OR APPOINTMENT OF A PERSON TO THE POSITION OF ACTING OPERATIONS DIRECTOR

**WHEREAS,** The Town Council is the fiscal and legislative body of the Town of Highland, pursuant to IC 36-5 et sequitur;

WHEREAS, IC 36-1-3-2 confers upon all local units the powers that they need for the effective operation of government as to local affairs;

WHEREAS, IC 36-1-3-6 (b)(1) prescribes that any such exercise of power shall be authorized through enactment of an ordinance passed by the legislative body; and

WHEREAS, IC 36-1-4, sections 14 and 15 provide in pertinent parts for the establishment of a system of employment for any class of employee and for fixing the level of compensation of its officers and employees; and

WHEREAS, IC 36-5, Chapters 3 and 4 provide additional authority and guidelines for fixing the level of compensation of officers and employees in towns; and

WHEREAS, The Town Council as the Legislative Body, did pass and adopt Ordinance No. 1691 an Ordinance to Establish the Wage and Salary Rates of the Elected Officers, the Non-elected Officers and the Employees of the Town of Highland, having amended it four times since its adoption; and

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 1378, an Ordinance Establishing the Compensation and Benefits for the Employees of the Town of Highland amended multiple times since its adoption, commonly called the Municipal Employee Handbook, remains in full force and effect;

WHEREAS, The Public Works Director has communicated the desire to have someone perform the duties associated with his former position of Operations Director, as he acclimates and assumes the duties of public works director;

WHEREAS, The Town Council and the Clerk-Treasurer desire to review organization of the agency that delivers services associated with potable water, wastewater, stormwater, solid waste and road maintenance and preservation for optimization and current statutory requirements;

WHEREAS, The Town Council now desires to take the proper steps to authorize and approve an appropriate measure or measures sufficient to carry-out the foregoing,

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY ENACTED** by the Town Council of the Town of Highland, Lake County, Indiana, as follows:

- **Section 1.** That the Town Council makes the following findings and determinations, pursuant to its authority under IC 36-1-4-15 to fix the level of compensation of its officers and employees, as well as the authority described in the preamble to this enactment:
- (A) That the Highland Town Council now finds and determines that a reasonable time to review organization of the agency that delivers services associated with potable water, wastewater, stormwater, solid waste and road maintenance and preservation for optimization and current statutory requirements is desirable;
- (B) That the Highland Town Council further finds and determines that The Public Works Director has communicated the desire to have someone perform the duties associated with his former position of Operations Director, as he acclimates and assumes the duties of public works director;
- (C) That the Highland Town Council still further finds and determines that Section 4.11 of the Compensation and Benefits Ordinance states in pertinent part "If a regular full time employee is assigned to temporarily replace another employee at a higher grade-level for an extended period of time, that employee will begin to receive a greater rate of pay after completing thirty (30) calendar days in that position. The actual rate will be subject to approval by the Town Council. All other benefits remain the same;
- (D) That the Highland Town Council still further finds and determines that Section 2(A) of Ordinance 1691 Fixing the Wages and Salaries of the Elected Officers, Appointed Officers and Employees expressly provides "...all new employees will start at the identified starting wage or salary for their job position unless approved by the Town Council or authorized board of jurisdiction to do otherwise;"
- **Section 2.** That based upon the foregoing, the Town Council does hereby authorize and approve the following:
- (A) That pursuant to its authority under IC 36-1-4-15 to fix the level of compensation of its officers and employees, as well as the authority described in the preamble to this enactment, the Public Works Director is hereby authorized:
  - (1) to promote from within the current workforce to the position of *acting* Operations Director; or
  - (2) to recommend to the Town Council, as the appointing authority, a person for hire to the position of *acting* Operations Director;
- (B) That pursuant to its authority under IC 36-1-4-15 to fix the level of compensation of its officers and employees, as well as the authority described in the preamble to this enactment, the relevant provisions set forth in the Ordinance No. 1378 establishing the *Compensation and Benefits for the Employees of the Town of Highland* as amended, particularly outlined in Section 4.11 of that ordinance, shall be suspended only to the extent necessary to support the promotion of a person within the municipal workforce to the position named in this enactment;
- (C) That pursuant to its authority under IC 36-1-4-15 to fix the level of compensation of its officers and employees, as well as the authority described in the preamble to this enactment, the relevant provisions set forth in the Ordinance No. 1691 establishing the *Wage and Salaries for the Elected Officers, Appointed Officers and Employees of the Town of Highland* as amended, particularly outlined in Section 2 (A) of that

ordinance, shall be suspended only to the extent necessary to support the hiring of a person to the position named in this enactment;

- (D) That pursuant to the foregoing, the person promoted or hired to the position named in this enactment shall be authorized to be paid at the rate currently fixed for the position of operations director, with a vehicle or without a vehicle, as may apply, while performing as *acting* operations director;
- **Section 3.** That the adoption of this enactment shall in no way be construed as a precedent for the subject department or any other department of the municipality, nor shall it be construed as creating an entitlement for any other workers in any other department, but rather the provisions in this enactment are specific, unique and particularly conferred, and any provisions suspended in the Compensation and Benefits ordinance are only suspended for the specific purposes of this enactment and shall not extend beyond its particular authority;

**Section 4.** That authority under this enactment shall be seen as complementary to and not in derogation of the authority of the Clerk-Treasurer under IC 36-5-6-6;

A JOINT RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF WORKS AND THE WATER WORKS BOARD OF DIRECTORS APPROVING AND AUTHORIZING CHANGE ORDER NO. 1 TO THE CONSTRUCTION CONTRACT BETWEEN THE HIGHLAND WATER WORKS BOARD OF DIRECTORS AND GRIMMER CONSTRUCTION, INC. FOR THE ROBERTSON PL. & ROSEWOOD CT. WATER MAIN REPLACEMENT & STREET IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

Whereas, The Town of Highland, through its Town Council, which is the Works Board of the Municipality pursuant to I.C. 36-1-2-24(3), has determined that a need exists to make certain public improvements and repairs to roadway infrastructure on Robertson Place (south of 81st Street) and Rosewood Ct. including the replacement of defective curb and sidewalk, pavement, and tree removal and replacement and have hereto approved a project to be described as the Robertson Pl. and Rosewood Ct. Water Main Replacement & Street Improvement Project (Project); and

Whereas, The Town of Highland has procured a Community Development Block Grant, from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development through an application filing with the Lake County Community Development Department in the amount of \$119,653.63, which will offset the costs for the roadway improvements described herein; and

Whereas, The Waterworks District of Highland (WW District) is governed by its Board of Waterworks Directors, pursuant to the provisions of IC 8-1.5-4 et seq.; and

Whereas, IC 8-1.5-4-4 specifically provides that the Board of Water Works Directors shall manage and control all works of the waterworks and may purchase, acquire, construct, reconstruct, operate, repair and maintain all water works; and

Whereas, The WW District, through its Board of Directors, has determine the need to replace and upsize the existing water lines within the Project boundaries, as described herein, in order to improve water flow and water quality; has determined that it would be in the best interest of the utility to coordinate the work with the Project; and have agreed to fund its share of the construction costs and engineering services necessary to complete the work; and

Whereas, On May 28, 2020, the Waterworks District adopted Joint Resolution No. 2020-07 and on April 11, 2020, Town Council through its Board of Works, adopted Order of the Works Board 2020-28, awarding a Project to Grimmer Construction, Incorporated in the total amount of Five Hundred Thirty Thousand Five Hundred Thirty Dollars and 00/100 (\$530,530.00), to be the lowest responsive and responsible bid, of which Three Hundred Thirty-six Thousand One Hundred Three Dollars and 90/100 Cents (\$336,103.90) was for waterworks improvements; and

Whereas, During the course of construction of the Project, it has become necessary to change or alter the original specifications of the project and/or to increase or decrease the planned material quantities; and

Whereas, NIES Engineering, Inc., a licensed engineer performing construction engineering services on this project, has specifically identified and presented Change Order No. 1, attached herewith, which details the changes and alterations to the Project which have

a net increase in the total contract amount of Twenty-one Thousand Five Hundred Eleven Dollars and 25/100 Cents (\$21,511.25); and

Whereas, The increase in cost, as determined by NIES, is allocated to the Board of Works in the amount of Thirteen Thousand Fifty-five Dollars and 00/100 Cents (\$13,055.00) and to the Water Works Board in the amount of Eight Thousand Four Hundred Fifty-six Dollars and 25/100 Cents (\$8,456.25); and

Whereas, The Town of Highland, through its Board of Works, now desires to approve and authorize the Change Order as described; and

Whereas, The Waterworks District of Highland, through its Board of Directors, now desires to approve and authorize the Change Order as describe; and

**Now Therefore Be it Resolved** by the Board of Directors of the Waterworks District of Highland, Lake County, Indiana, as follows:

**Section 1.** That the *First Addendum* to the Construction Contract with Grimmer Construction, Incorporated for the Robertson Pl. & Rosewood Ct. Water Main Replacement & Street Improvement Project, as prepared by NIES Engineering, Incorporated, a licensed engineer performing construction engineering services on this Project, is hereby determined to be directly related to the original project and is hereby approved, adopted, and ratified in each and every respect;

**Section 2.** That this addendum is hereby ordered to be known as **Change Order No. 1**, issued to increase net changes to the original agreement in the amount of Twenty-one Thousand, Five Hundred Eleven Dollars and 25/100 Cents (\$21,511.25), bringing the total value of the entire agreement with any and all change orders approved to date to Five Hundred Fifty-two Thousand, Forty-one Dollars and 25/100 (\$552,041.25) allocated as follows;

**Section 4.** That the Public Works Director is hereby authorized to execute the necessary documents with his signature.

### DESCRIPTION OF CHANGE:

- Add replacement of 10 sanitary laterals crossing the water main trench along Robertson Place. The length of replacement pipe per lateral ranges from 14 to 17 feet (15 feet typical). This results in an increase to the contract price of \$8,456.25 (total amount apportioned to Waterworks Board).
- Add 165 feet of storm sewer and two catch basins at the end of Rosewood Court, extending from an
  existing storm structure in the curb to the backyards of 8211/8212 Rosewood Court. This results in
  an increase to the contract price of \$13,055.00 (total amount apportioned to Works Board), of which
  \$3,915.00 is for work within the ROW and \$9,140.00 is for work outside the ROW.
  - For work within the ROW, the Works Board's portion is \$3,915.00.
  - b. For work outside the ROW, the Works Board's portion of \$9,140.00 would be funded by a cost share agreement between the Sanitary District and the affected residents. Sanitary District Resolution 2020-16 authorizes 50% of the cost (\$4,570.00) to be paid by the Sanitary District and 50% of the cost (\$4,570.00) to be paid by and divided equally between the two property owners.

### REASON FOR CHANGE:

- 1. During the course of water main installation, each sanitary lateral along Robertson Place was found to be constructed of multiple materials. Within the trench, each lateral was clay pipe. However, towards the curb, the clay pipe was found loosely inserted into concrete pipe that was then connected to PVC pipe. In order to avoid potential damage to the laterals during curb replacement, each lateral was replaced with PVC pipe from the house-side of the trench to the existing PVC pipe past the curb.
- 2. During the course of concrete sidewalk and driveway apron removal, a 4-inch drain pipe was found partially embedded in the sidewalk and along the driveway apron at 8212 Rosewood Court. This pipe collected storm water from the rear yards (both gravity and pumped flow) and discharged over the driveway apron and through a slot in the curb. Since capping or removing the drain pipe would cause or exacerbate drainage issues at 8211 and 8212 Rosewood Court, it was determined in consultation with the impacted residents and Town staff that extending a storm pipe from the existing storm sewer in the street to the rear yards would best facilitate proper drainage and promote health and safety.

### 11.15.010 Establishment.

- (A) A community events commission is established to advise and assist with the planning and execution of special events within the town of Highland. All corporate powers of the town of Highland are vested in the town council. No individual member of the commission or collective action of the commission may direct action to be taken by the town council, any employee or contractor of the town.
- (B) The commission shall consist of 16 voting members, with seven members appointed to staggered terms of office and nine members appointed to concurrent annual terms of office. One member shall serve an initial term expiring on the first day of January 2008; three members shall serve an initial term expiring on the first day of January 2010; and three members shall serve an initial term expiring on the first day of January 2011. Thereafter, each member serving a staggered term may be appointed to a term of four years. Each member of the annual concurrent appointments may be reappointed to a term of one year. The municipal executive shall make the initial one-year appointment, one of the initial two-year appointments and one of the initial three-year appointments. The legislative body shall make two of the initial two-year appointments. Finally, the legislative body shall also make the annual one-year term appointments.
- (C) All members of the commission shall serve until their successors have been appointed and confirmed, subject to the limitation set forth in IC  $\underline{36-1-8-10}$ (c).
- (D) Members of the commission serve at the pleasure of the appointing authority. New members will be appointed to fulfill the unexpired term of a member whose seat becomes vacant for any reason during his or her term. Successive appointments shall be made by the proper appointing authority making the initial appointments as described in subsection (B) of this section.
- (E) The senior management staff person from each department of the town shall serve as ex officio, nonvoting members of the commission.
- (F) No person shall be appointed as voting member of the commission who has not attained the age of 18 years and who is not a resident of Highland.

- (G) The members of the commission serve without compensation. Members of the commission shall not accept gifts, gratuities or other consideration from contracted vendors or vendors under consideration for use at a special event.
- (H) A faithful performance or surety bond as prescribed by IC <u>5-4-1</u> et seq. in the amount of \$10,000 shall be obtained for the commission to cover the faithful performance of the duties of the officers and members of the commission, including the duty to comply with IC <u>35-44-1-2</u> and the duty to account properly for all monies and property received in consequence of the duties and activities set forth in this chapter.
- (I) The premium upon said bond shall be paid from the fund established by HMC <u>11.15.050</u> or any other proper fund of the municipality. Said bond may be executed with any recognized and responsible surety company authorized to do business in the state of Indiana, pursuant to IC <u>5-4-1</u> et seq.
- (J) The bond shall be filed in the office of the clerk-treasurer and recorded in the office of the recorder of Lake County, pursuant to IC <u>5-4-1-5.1</u>.
- (K) The clerk-treasurer shall serve as the purchasing agent for the activities of the commission, pursuant to HMC 3.05.050(D)(9) and IC 5-22 et seq.

### 11.15.020 Organization and structure.

- (A) At its first regular meeting each year, the commission shall elect from its members a chairperson, first vice-chairperson, a second vice-chairperson who shall also act as financial secretary and a secretary.
- (B) The first vice-chairperson shall act as chairperson during the absence or disability of the chairperson. In absence or disability of the chairperson and the first vice-chairperson, the second vice-chairperson shall act as chairperson. In the event that the chairperson, the first vice-chairperson and the second vice-chairperson are absent, the secretary will preside over the remainder of the body constituting a quorum which then shall appoint a chairperson pro tempore, who shall perform the duties of the chairperson for that meeting.
- (C) Subject to the provisions of this chapter, the chairperson shall preside over the meetings of the commission and shall exercise and perform such duties as are assigned to him or her by this section, as well as perform the duties customary to the office as set forth in the parliamentary authority.
- (D) The clerk-treasurer shall serve as treasurer of the commission, pursuant to IC <u>5-13-5-2</u>. The second vice-chairperson shall also serve as financial secretary. The financial secretary shall collect all valid invoices for goods or services obtained in carrying out the lawful purposes of the commission. The financial secretary shall be responsible for the receipt of applications and associated fees and charges and properly cause them to be deposited with the clerk-treasurer

according to the provisions of HMC <u>11.20.020</u>. The financial secretary shall prepare and sign accounts payable vouchers to be filed for allowance by the town council, all according to IC <u>5-11-9</u>, <u>5-11-10</u> and <u>36-5-4</u> et seq.

- (E) The secretary shall be responsible for preparing the agenda for commission meetings in consultation with the chair and providing public notice of the meetings of the commission. The secretary shall take roll at the meetings of the commission and shall cause minutes to be kept, showing the vote of the commission members on each question and on the other official actions of the commission, all pursuant to IC <u>5-14-1.5</u>. The secretary shall maintain copies of communications and reports considered by the commission. In addition, the secretary performs the duties customary to the office as set forth in the parliamentary authority.
- (F) The commission is a public body and shall comply with the Indiana Open Meetings Act by providing public notice of its meetings consistent with the Open Meetings Act, pursuant to IC  $\underline{5-14-1.5}$ . Its records shall be considered public records, governed by IC  $\underline{5-14-3}$  et seq.
- (G) The parliamentary authority for the commission is Robert's Rules of Order, newly revised. The commission may take no action on any agenda item unless a quorum of the commission is present. A quorum shall be six members of the commission.
- (H) At its first organizational meeting and at the first meeting of each calendar year thereafter, the commission shall establish dates and times for its regularly scheduled meetings. In formulating its meeting schedule, the commission shall attempt to avoid conflict with members' work and vacation schedules. Meetings shall generally be held once per month, unless there is no business to be considered by the commission. Meeting dates, once established, shall be filed with the clerk-treasurer. [Ord. 1398 § 1, 2008. Code 2000 § 32.41].

11.15.030 Purposes.

(A) The community events commission is established to advise and assist with the planning and execution of special events within the town of Highland.

(B) The purposes of the commission are:

(1) To coordinate the annual celebration of the Fourth of July festivities (Independence Day) including, but not limited to: a festival, parade and fireworks;

(2) To coordinate a Christmas parade;

(3) To coordinate Memorial Day and Veteran's Day ceremonies;

(4) To assist with other special events the commission determines will promote good will in the town of Highland, including, but not limited to, an annual eighteenth century historical reenactment, seasonal festivals, beer gardens, block parties, parades, arts and craft shows and itinerant restaurants;

(5) To appoint standing and/or ad hoc committees to sponsor and

produce specific special events; and

(6) To formulate ordinances for consideration by the town council establishing standard operating policies, rules and regulations applicable to special events and permits therefor, as the commission may deem necessary to conduct its affairs.

### 11.15.040 Annual report.

The community events commission shall prepare and submit an annual report concerning special events to the town council and clerk-treasurer in December of each year.

### 11.15.050 Special events nonreverting operating fund.

- (A) There is hereby authorized, created and established a special nonreverting operating fund, to be called the special events nonreverting operating fund for use by the town in support of the purposes of this chapter.
- (B) The fund is dedicated and established to provide operating resources for parks and recreation programs, operations and special events undertaken by the town under advice of its special events advisory commission, pursuant to the authority of IC <u>36-10-2</u> and <u>36-1-3</u> et seq.
- (C) Expenditures from this fund shall be governed by the following provisions:
  - (1) Expenditures from this fund shall be for the purposes and in support of the purposes set forth in this chapter and according to the laws and relevant guidelines governing the disposition of the assets, which comprise the fund, provided the expenditures shall be only operating in nature;
  - (2) Neither the establishment nor the purposes of this fund shall be in derogation of the lawful purposes or construed to exclude the lawful purpose or expenditure from such other funds of the municipality for the same or similar purposes;
  - (3) Expenditures from the fund may be made only upon appropriation by the fiscal body for the purpose for which the fund is specifically established, in the manner provided by statute for making other appropriations, and shall be disbursed only on approved accounts payable vouchers allowed by the town council, all pursuant to IC <u>5-11-10</u>, <u>36-5-4</u> and <u>36-5</u> et seq.
- (D) The sources of money for the fund are the following:

- (1) Gifts and donations from any person given expressly for the purposes and objects of the fund, unless otherwise directed by action of the town council;
- (2) User fees and other charges as may be authorized and fixed by the community events commission in connection with special community events;
- (3) Pursuant to IC <u>5-13-9</u> and this code, moneys in the fund may be invested; provided, that the yields from the purchase and sale of any such investments be deposited with the fund.
- (E) The appropriations and the cash on deposit to the credit of the fund shall not revert to any other fund but remain with the special events nonreverting operating fund at year end and until such time as an ordinance is passed dealing with the disposition of the assets of this fund.
- (F) The clerk-treasurer, as municipal fiscal officer, is hereby directed and authorized to perform such duties and keep such accounts as to fulfill the purpose of the funds herein named and to carry out the provisions of this chapter.
- (G) The nonreverting special event fund may be liquidated by an ordinance approved by the town council. Should there be any funds left on deposit in said fund, such funds shall revert to the general fund of the town unless otherwise provided by ordinance of the town council. [Ord. 1398 § 1, 2008; Ord. 1507 § 2, 2012. Code 2000 § 32.44].

### 11.15.060 Budget and disposition of funds.

- (A) The officers of the community events commission will submit an annual budget for the expenditure of special event revenue to the community events commission for review by July 30th of each calendar year. A budget recommended by the commission shall be submitted to the town clerk-treasurer to meet the publication timetable of IC <u>6-1.1-17</u> et seq. and then to the town council by the first Friday of August of each calendar year. By September 30th of each calendar year the town council will approve an annual budget for the expenditure of special event revenues for the succeeding calendar and fiscal year.
- (B) The clerk-treasurer shall be the approving authority for the expenditure of special event revenues less than \$10,000; expenditures greater than \$10,000 require prior approval of the town council. [Ord. 1398 § 1, 2008. Code 2000 § 32.45].

Whereas, The *Mad Bomber Fireworks Productions* of Kingsbury Indiana has presented to the Community Events Commission a proposed agreement for professional pyrotechnic and Fire works Display services for the Town of Highland to be conducted on September 26, 2020;

Whereas, The Community Events Commission favorably recommends to the purchasing agency, the approval of the proposed agreement for professional pyrotechnic and Fire works Display services for the Town of Highland to be conducted on September 26, 2020 by *Mad Bomber Fireworks Productions* of Kingsbury Indiana;

Whereas, These professional services owing to their unique requirements and character, as a service, may be purchased in a manner that is determined to be reasonable, pursuant to Section 3.05.090 of the HMC and IC 5-22-6;

Whereas, The Town Council as the Works Board of the Municipality, pursuant to Section 3.05.030 (A)(1) of the HMC serves as purchasing agency for the Municipality and its executive departments except those executive departments which are expressly subject to the purchasing authority of a relevant governing board of jurisdiction; and

Whereas, The purchase price exceeds \$15,000.00, pursuant to Section 3.05.040 (C) and Section 3.05.050(B)(3) of the HMC requires the express approval of the purchasing agency; and

Whereas, The purchase of services will be supported by the Special Events Non Reverting Fund of the Town and there is sufficient appropriations or resources in order to support the purchase of services; and

Whereas, The Town Council now desires to approve, authorize and allow the purchase of services pursuant to the terms stated herein, **Now Therefore Be it Ordered** by the Town Council of the Town of Highland, Lake County, Indiana, acting as the Works Board, as follows:

- **Section 1**. That the proposal for pyrotechnic and fireworks display services of **Mad Bomber Fireworks Productions**, 3999 E. Hupp Road, Building R-3-1, LaPorte, Indiana, 46350, prepared and presented by its Executive Secretary, Kelley Hatfield, which includes presentation of a Fireworks Display on September 26, 2020, according to the written terms set forth in the proposal, is hereby accepted, approved and adopted in every respect, provided that **Mad Bomber Fireworks Productions** complies with the provisions of IC 22-5-1.7 et seq., and completes the relevant portions of the attached exhibit styled as Addendum for e-verify;

Witness: Seller agrees to provide and Buyer agrees to purchase a Fireworks Displays in accordance with the program agreed upon. Buyer will pay Seller a sum of \$25,000.00 for Display. Upon acceptance of this agreement Buyer will pay Seller a sum of Waived as an Earnest Money Deposit with the Balance due and payable within 30 days after the display date agreed upon. A late charge of 1 ½% per month will be assessed on accounts not paid within thirty days of display date Buyer agrees to pay any and all collection costs, including reasonable attorney's fees and court cost incurred by Seller in the collection or attempted collection of any amount due under this agreement and invoice.

Both Seller and Buyer mutually agree to the following terms, conditions, and stipulations:

- 1. Selter will present said Fireworks Display on the evenings of the <u>September 26</u>, 2020, it being understood that should there be inclement weather the day of the display the Seller has sole discretion to cancel display. An alternate display date will be given within six months of the original display date agreeable to both the Seller and Buyer.
- 2. The Fee for cancellation for any reason of the Fireworks Display is 40% of the agreement price if Buyer chooses to not select another display date within six months of the original display date.
- 3. Buyer will provide a sufficient area for the Display, including a minimum spectator set back of 350° feet at all points from the discharge area. Buyer will provide protection of the display by roping-off or other suitable means. Buyer will provide adequate police protection to prevent spectators from entering display area. Buyer agrees to search the fallout area at first light following a night display.
- 4. Seller reserves the right to terminate the Display in the event that persons enter the secured. Danger Zone and Security is unable to secure the Danger Zone.
- 5. Selier agrees to provide Qualified Technicians to take charge of and present said Display.


