Study Session. The Twenty-Eighth Town Council of the Town of Highland, Lake County, Indiana met in a study session preceding the regular meeting on Monday, August 13, 2018 at 6:40 O'clock P.M. in the regular place, the meeting chambers of the Highland Municipal Building, 3333 Ridge Road, Highland, Indiana.

Silent Roll Call: Councilors Bernie Zemen, Mark Herak, Dan Vassar, and Konnie Kuiper were present. Councilor Steve Wagner was absent owing to work. The Clerk-Treasurer, Michael W. Griffin was present to memorialize the proceedings. A quorum was attained.

General Substance of Matters Discussed.

- 1. The Town Council reviewed and discussed the agenda of the imminent regular meeting.
- 2. The Town Council and Clerk-Treasurer discussed an request from the AIM Medical Trust, to explore a move to take the two line of duty death survivors who are entitled to the same group coverage as we offer the workforce for life, about a prospective plan in which the Town would provide for premiums for Medicare A B and D in an effort to share liability with Medicare rather than solely on the AIM Insurance Corpus. It was noted that any plan should leave both no worse off, perhaps with lower out of pocket for the year and making clear that such a change would be fully voluntary. There was no objection stated to explore the matter with the survivors.
- 3. The Town Council discussed with the Public Works Director the status of the Sidewalk Inspection Program. It was noted that the program was challenged in that when letters of remediation or correction regarding an inspected sidewalk are mailed to contiguous property owners, in many cases the letters are ignored. The Public Works Director appealed to the Town Council to consider adding an enforcement mechanism, provided in IC 36-9-17 et seq., which is the General Improvement Law.

The study session ended at 7:05 O'clock p.m.

The Town Council President, Mark A. Herak presided. The Town Clerk-Treasurer, Michael W. Griffin, was present to memorialize the proceedings. The meeting was opened with the Councilor Dan Vassar reciting the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and offering a prayer.

Special Orders:

- 1. Administration of Oath of Office for Police Officer Candidate Glenn P. DuRocher. Police Officer Candidate DuRocher was appointed by the Town Board of Metropolitan Police Commissioners at its meeting of 12 July 2018, with the appointment to be effective 29 July 2018, but not earlier than Indiana Pension Retirement System INPRS approval.
 - (a) Action by Town Council determining that the named Candidate Meets the Qualifications for such position, as Determined by the Town Board of Metropolitan Police Commissioners and as now approved by the Highland Town Council, pursuant to IC 36-8-9-4(a). Councilor Vassar moved that the Town Council now approve that the candidate meets the qualifications for the position of police officer, noting that such qualifications are determined by the Town Board of Metropolitan Police Commissioners. Councilor Kuiper seconded. Upon a roll call vote, there four affirmatives and no negatives. The motion passed. 1. **Introduced Ordinance No. 1683:** An Ordinance To Still Further Amend Chapter 2.50 of the Highland Municipal Code Regarding the Public Records Management, and Establish a Special Purpose Fund, All Pursuant To I.C. 36-1-5 and I.C. 5-14-3 Et Seq. (At its meeting of July 23, 2018, Councilor Zemen introduced and filed the ordinance. There was no further action. The Town Council further discussed and conducted mark-up on this ordinance at its Study Session conducted, Monday, August 6, 2018.)

Councilor Zemen moved for the passage and adoption of introduced Ordinance No. 1683. Councilor Kuiper seconded. Upon a roll call vote, there were four affirmatives and no negatives. The motion passed. The ordinance was adopted.

ORDINANCE No. 1683 of the TOWN of HIGHLAND, INDIANA

AN ORDINANCE TO STILL FURTHER AMEND CHAPTER 2.50 OF THE HIGHLAND MUNICIPAL CODE REGARDING THE PUBLIC RECORDS MANAGEMENT, AND ESTABLISH A SPECIAL PURPOSE FUND, ALL PURSUANT TO I.C. 36-1-5 AND I.C. 5-14-3 ET SEQ.

- WHEREAS, Title 36, Article 1, Chapter 5 of the Indiana Code provides that the legislative body of a unit **shall** codify, revise, rearrange, or compile the ordinances of the unit into a complete, simplified code excluding formal parts of the ordinances;
- WHEREAS, The legislative body of this unit, the Town of Highland, is the Town Council, pursuant to IC 36-1-2-9(5) and IC 36-5-2-2;
- WHEREAS, IC 5-14-3 specifically provides the policy for records access for all public agencies in Indiana;
- WHEREAS, The Town Council has previously adopted the provisions of IC 5-14-3, codified as Chapter 2.50 in the Highland Municipal Code;
- WHEREAS, The Highland Town Council has determined that the amendment of the Highland Municipal Code regarding its provisions dealing with records management in order to clarify prior provisions and to update existing provisions consistent with current law to be an exercise of local authority consistent with the provisions of IC 5-14-3 and IC 36-1-3 and necessary or desirable in the conduct of its affairs;
- WHEREAS, The Highland Town Council has further determined that a technical amendment of the Highland Municipal Code regarding its recently adopted changes to the Public Records Management Chapter would further perfect the municipal code by selectively adopting statutory text; and
- WHEREAS, The present general and permanent ordinances of the Town of Highland, formally codified in 2012, are in need of technical and substantive modifications desirable to further improve and perfect the Code; and
- WHEREAS, The Town Council, is persuaded that it is necessary and desirable to adopt a further technical and substantive modification to Chapter 2.50 in order to further improve and perfect the Code,
- Now, Therefore, Be it hereby ordained by the Town Council of the Town of Highland, Lake County, Indiana, as follows:
- $\textbf{Section 1.} \quad \textbf{That Section 2.50.070 of the Highland Municipal Code is hereby renamed and it shall read as follows:}$

2.50.070 Public records which are Not Disclosable and which are Disclosable.

Section 2. That Subdivision (B) (2) and (B)(5) of Section 2.50.070 of the Highland Municipal Code are hereby repealed and shall be replaced by successor subdivisions, which shall be identified and read as follows:

2.50.070 Public records which are Not Disclosable and which are Disclosable.

- (B)(2) Test questions, scoring keys, and other examination data used in administering a licensing examination, or an examination for employment, before the examination is given or if it is to be given again.
- (B) (5) Personnel files of public employees and files of applicants for public employment, subject to the prohibitions in subsection (A)(12) of this section. However, when responding to inquiries made regarding the employment of a former employee, disclosure shall be confined to dates of service, department assigned, job title, and rate of pay, unless advised by counsel to the contrary.

Section 3. That Section 2.50.100 of the Highland Municipal Code shall be amended by *adding a new Subdivision* to be styled as Subdivision J, which shall read as follows:

2.50.100 Fees schedule - Document reproduction - Certification.

(J) Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, when providing a duplicate of a computer tape, computer disc, microfilm, law enforcement recording, or similar or analogous record system containing information owned by the public agency or entrusted to it, a public agency may charge a fee or fees, uniform to all purchasers, that does not exceed the sum of the agency's direct cost of supplying the information in that form, provided that fee is approved in this chapter. The following fees are hereby authorized and approved to be collected pursuant to this section:

1. Media Fees.

For records provided on a compact disk (CD), or digital video disk (DVD):

\$ 1.00

For records provided on a flash drive, thumb drive or similar medium:

\$10.00

Electronic law enforcement video documents fee.
 For Law enforcement video recordings captured by an in-car camera or captured by a departmental booking camera will be provided for the sum of the base fee plus the appropriate media fee.

Base Fee: \$120.00

Section 4. That Article II of the Highland Municipal Code, contained in Chapter 9.10, which organizes Sections 9.10.060 through 9.10.240 of the Municipal Code shall be amended by *renaming the Article as follows*:

Article II Statutory Law Enforcement Funds

Section 5. That Article II, contained in Chapter 9.20, which organizes Sections 9.20.060 through 9.20.100, entitled *Safe Neighborhood Grant Fund*, of the Highland Municipal Code shall be repealed and the fiscal officer is authorized to retire the fund pursuant to HMC Section 9.20.100(B);

Section 6. That the Highland Municipal Code be hereby amended by the establishment of a new Article to be contained in Chapter 9.20 which shall organize *Sections 9.20.060 through 9.20.100*, to be entitled **Article II Law Enforcement Video Recording Program Fund**, which shall read as follows:

Article II. Law Enforcement Video Recording Program Fund

9.20.060 Establishment of Law Enforcement Video Recording Program Fund.
(A) There is hereby authorized, created and established a special purpose fund of the Town of Highland, to be called the Law Enforcement Video Recording Program Fund, pursuant to IC 36-1-3 et seq;

- (B) The Law Enforcement Video Recording Program Fund is dedicated and established for accumulating funds to provide resources to support the lawful purposes of the municipality and public safety purposes as are identified in this Article and IC 5-14-3-8(l);
- (C) The sources of funding for the Law Enforcement Video Recording Program Fund include the following:
- The user fees charged, collected and authorized by IC 5-14-3-8(g) and Section 2.50.100(j) of the Highland Municipal Code, for providing a duplicate of a computer disc, or other storage medium of a law enforcement recording;
- (2) Interest earned from the investment of moneys on deposit to the credit of the fund, provided such investments are conducted pursuant to IC <u>5-13-9</u> et seq., and Chapter 3.40 of the Highland Municipal Code:
- (3) Gifts, donations and other voluntary contributions from any person to the fund consistent with the lawful purposes and objects of the fund;
- (4) Money derived from state or federal reimbursement grants, matching funds, or contributions for such projects as may be consistent with the objects and purposes of this fund, and the associated grant, provided it is not inconsistent with the guidelines and rules regarding the use and accounting of the federal source proceeds of the grant program;

9.20.070 Purposes, uses and permissible expenditures.

(A) Expenditures from the Law Enforcement Video Recording Program Fund shall only be used for one or more of the following purposes:

- (1) To purchase cameras and other equipment for use in connection with the agency's law enforcement recording program;
- (2) To pay the lawful costs and expenses associated with training concerning law enforcement recording;
- (3) To defray the expenses of storing, producing, and copying law enforcement recordings;
- (B) Expenditures from this fund shall be for and in support of the purposes set forth above according to laws of the State of Indiana and if grants require it, the laws of the United States.

9.20.080 Expenditure without appropriation.

The expenditures from the Law Enforcement Video Recording Program Fund are hereby deemed dedicated and appropriated for the purpose for which the fund is specifically dedicated, may be made without appropriation for the purpose for which the fund is specifically established, and shall be disbursed only on approved accounts payable vouchers allowed by the legislative body, all pursuant to IC 5-14-3-8 (l);

9.20.090 Investments authorized.

Money in the Law Enforcement Video Recording Program Fund may be invested provided that the yields from the purchase and sale of any such investments shall be deposited with the fund pursuant to IC 5-13-9 and the provisions of the Highland Municipal Code governing investments and deposits.

9.20.100 Preservation and disposition of fund assets.

(A) All unused and unencumbered cash on deposit to the credit of the Law Enforcement Video Recording Program Fund does not revert to the corporation general fund nor to any other fund but shall remain with the Law Enforcement Video Recording Program Fund until the fund is repealed or rescinded by action of the town council;

(B) Fiscal Officer and Cashbook Duties. The clerk-treasurer, as municipal fiscal officer, is hereby authorized to perform such duties and keep such accounts as to fulfill the purpose of the resources of the Law Enforcement Video Recording Program Fund all consistent with the provisions of IC <u>5-13-5</u> et seq.

Section 7. That this ordinance shall be effective from and after its passage and adoption as evidenced by the signature of the Town Council President and attested thereto by the Clerk-Treasurer, all pursuant to IC 36-5-2-10 and IC 36-5-2-10.2.

RESOLUTION NO. 2018-34

AN EXIGENT RESOLUTION PROVIDING for the TRANSFER of APPROPRIATION BALANCES from and AMONG MAJOR BUDGET CLASSIFICATIONS in the INFORMATION COMMUNICATIONS TECHNOLOGY FUND as REQUESTED BY THE PROPER OFFICER AND FORWARDED to the TOWN COUNCIL for its ACTION PURSUANT TO IC 6-1.1-18-6.

WHEREAS, It has been determined that certain exigent conditions have developed since adoption of the original budget and it is now necessary to transfer certain appropriations into different categories than were initially appropriated for the various functions of the Information Communications Technology Fund;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Town Council of the Town of Highland, Lake County, Indiana as follows:

Section 1. That for the expenses of said municipality, the following appropriations are hereby transferred and set apart out of the funds hereinafter named for the purposes specified, subject to the laws governing the same, such sums herein transferred unless otherwise stipulated by law;

Section 2.
