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Enrolled Minutes of the Sixteenth Regular or Special Meeting For the Twenty-Ninth Highland Town Council Regular Plenary Meeting (Electronic) Monday, August 10, 2020

The Twenty-Ninth Town Council of the Town of Highland, Lake County, Indiana met in its regular plenary session on Monday, August 10, 2020 at 6:38 O'clock P.M. in the regular place, the Highland Municipal Building, 3333 Ridge Road, Highland, Indiana.

This meeting was convened as an *electronic meeting*, pursuant to Governor Holcomb's Executive Order 20-04 and 20-09, an extended by Executive Order 20-41, allowing such meetings pursuant to IC 5-14-1.5-3.6 for the duration of the COVID-19 public health emergency. All persons met remotely on a Zoom platform that allowed for real time interaction, and supported the public's ability to observe and record the proceedings. When the agenda item provided for public comment, this was supported as well. Councilor Herak, while not required under the Governor's orders, was present on the premises of the plenary meeting room.

The Town Council President, Mark J. Schocke presided. The Town Clerk-Treasurer, Michael W. Griffin, was present to memorialize the proceedings. The meeting was opened with the Town Council President leading in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

Roll Call: Present on roll call were Councilors Bernie Zemen, Mark Herak, Mark J. Schocke, Thomas Black and Roger Sheeman. The Clerk-Treasurer, Michael W. Griffin was present to memorialize the proceedings. A quorum was attained.

Additional Officials Present: (all electronically) John P. Reed, Town Attorney; Mark Knesek, Public Works Director; Pete Hojnicki, Police Chief; William R. Timmer, Jr., CFOD, Fire Chief; David Byers, CPRP, Director of Recreation; Kathy DeGuilio-Fox, Redevelopment Director; and Kenneth J. Mika, Building Commissioner, were present.

HIGHLAND 2020 CENSUS COMPLETE COUNT COMMITTEE Town Council Staff Report- August 10th Meeting

Current activities include the following: Social media posts and "Shares" by other Department's social media outlets; Cersus fiyers being distributed through the Highland Library; and, message on August waterfoll and Census content in August's Gazebo Express.

The US Census Bureau has begun their in-person visits to Lake County households that have not responded. To avoid an in-person visit, Highland residents should self-respond immediately, if they have not already done so by going to 2020census.gov to respond online; respondby phone by calling 844-330-2020; and, residents who have not already responded can fill out and mail in paper questionnaires.

Highland residents should be aware, as it pertains to Census in-house visits, of the following:

- The visits are being conducted by US Census Bureau personnel, NOT the Town of
- Census personnel will be wearing masks and other necessary PPE and will be trained in proper COVID-19 safety protocols.
- They will have a valid ID badge with their photograph, a U.S. Department of Commerce watermark, and an expiration date and they may also carry Census Bureau bags and other equipment with the Census Bureau logo.
- If no one is home when the census taker visits, the census taker will leave a notice of their visit with information about how to respond online, by phone or by mail.
- If the census taker who visits your home does not speak your language, you may request a return visit from a census taker who does speak your language.
- Highland residents are required by federal law to participate in the Census.

Also, this week the Census Bureau announced that it will be conduding response gathering one month earlier than previously announced. In-person visits and self-responses will now end on September 30°, rather than October 31" as previously scheduled. With much of the country under their 2010 self-response rate levels due to COVID-19, moving up the end date by a month, has the potential for significant under counts to be locked in for the next ten years.

As for Highland's self-response rate, the Bureau's final mailing and publicity sumounding the beginning of in-person visits, has resulted in an uptick in Highland's self-response rate to date. <u>Currently, we are outperforming 2010 self-response rates in four of Highland's six census tracts.</u> In addition, a fifth census tract is within less than 1 % of its 2010 level, and the response rate for the town as a whole is 1.1% from 2010.

As of statistics obtained today (August 7th), a 2010/ 2020 comparison of self-response rates to date, shows as follows:

Entire Town-2010 Final Self-Response Rate-80.6 % 2020 To Date-79.5% (-1.1%)

#405.01- 2010 Final Self-Response Rate - 74.4% 2020 To Date- 65.7% (-8.7%)

#405.02-2010 Final Self-Response Rate - 80.5% 2020 To Date- 79.9% (-0.6%)

#406- 2010 Final Self-Response Rate - 77.3% 2020 To Date- 78.9% (+1.6%)

#407- 2010 Final Self-Response Rate - 83.7% 2020 To Date- 85.3% (+1.6%)

#408.01- 2010 Final Self-Response Rate - 84.2% 2020 To Date-85.2% (+1.0%)

#408.02- 2010 Final Self-Response Rate - 83.7% 2020 To Date- 84.5% (+0.8%)

The census tract map included shows the two remaining census tracts, #405.01 and 405.02, that have not outperformed their 2010 self-response rate.

As of today, Highland's response rate is currently tied for 22nd best, out Indiana's 566 cities and towns. Indiana is currently tied for 11th best in the country.

ORDINANCE No. 1719.1691-D of the TOWN of HIGHLAND, INDIANA

AN ORDINANCE to AMEND ORDINANCE No. 1691 FIXING THE WAGE and SALARY RATES of the ELECTED OFFICERS, the NON-ELECTED OFFICERS, and the EMPLOYEES of the TOWN of HIGHLAND, INDIANA PARTICULARLY AMENDING PAY ASSOCIATED WITH THE ASSISTANT INSPECTOR FOR PLUMBING POSITION in the BUILDING AND INSPECTION DEPARTMENT and MAKING RELATED AMENDMENTS TO THE CHAPTER 15.20 of the HIGHLAND MUNICIPAL CODE

- WHEREAS, Title 36, Article 1 Chapter 4 of the Indiana Code confers certain general corporate powers on the several units of government in Indiana;
- **WHEREAS**, Section fifteen of that chapter specifically provides that a unit of government may fix the level of compensation of its officers and employees; and
- WHEREAS, I.C. 36-5-3-2 further provides in pertinent part that the town legislative body shall provide reasonable compensation for the other town officers and employees;
- WHEREAS, I.C. 36-5-3-2(b), still further provides that the Town Legislative body shall, by ordinance fix the compensation of its own members and the Town Clerk-Treasurer;
- WHEREAS, I.C. 36-5-3-2(c) still further provides that the compensation of an elected town officer may not be changed in the year for which it is fixed, nor may it be reduced below the amount fixed for the previous year;
- WHEREAS, The Town Council of the Town of Highland, as the town legislative body, now desires to amend the ordinance that was adopted to fix the compensation of its elected officers, appointed officers and employees of the Town for the year 2019 and thereafter as amended;
- WHEREAS, The Town Council of the Town of Highland, as the town legislative body, has been advised that it is desirable to make certain amendments to align language in HMC Section 15.20.020(G) regarding compensation of the Assistant Inspector for Plumbing and Section 8(B)(4) of the Wage and Salary Ordinance; and,
- WHEREAS, The Town Council of the Town of Highland, as the town legislative body, now desires to make certain amendments to align language in HMC Section 15.20.020(G) regarding compensation of the Assistant Inspector for Plumbing and Section 8(B)(4) of the Wage and Salary Ordinance for the year ensuing and thereafter,
- **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED** by the Town Council of the Town of Highland, Lake County, Indiana, that the Wages, Salaries, and special detail levels of the Officers and Employees of the Town of Highland, are hereby established and fixed, pursuant to the provisions indicated herein and as follows:
- Section 1. That Section 8 subdivision (B) (4) of Ordinance No. 1691 as amended be further amended by repealing it in its entirety and replacing with a successor subdivision, to be styled as Section 8 subdivision (B)(4) which shall read as follows:

Section 8. Building and Inspection Department. That subject to the provisions of this ordinance, the salary and wages for the non-elected officers and employees of the Town of Highland are hereby fixed for its Building and Inspection Department as follows:

(B) (4) Assistant Inspector for Plumbing (part-time)

\$17.00 For each one-unit plumbing examination proctored, pay unit rate as fixed pursuant to as provided in— § Section 15.20.020 (G)(1), and thus hereby amended.

WHEREAS, The Town Council is the fiscal and legislative body of the Town of Highland, pursuant to IC 36-5 et sequitur;

WHEREAS, IC 36-1-3-2 confers upon all local units the powers that they need for the effective operation of government as to local affairs;

WHEREAS, IC 36-1-3-6 (b)(1) prescribes that any such exercise of power shall be authorized through enactment of an ordinance passed by the legislative body; and

WHEREAS, The Public Works Director has communicated the desire to have someone perform the duties associated with his former position of Operations Director, as he acclimates and assumes the duties of public works director;

WHEREAS, The Town Council and the Clerk-Treasurer desire to review organization of the agency that delivers services associated with potable water, wastewater, stormwater, solid waste and road maintenance and preservation for optimization and current statutory requirements;

Whereas, The Town Council now desires to take the proper steps to authorize and approve an appropriate measure or measures sufficient to carry-out the foregoing,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY ENACTED by the Town Council of the Town of Highland, Lake County, Indiana, as follows:

Section 1. That the Town Council makes the following findings and determinations, pursuant to its authority under IC 36-1-4-15 to fix the level of compensation of its officers and employees, as well as the authority described in the preamble to this enactment:

- (A) That the Highland Town Council now finds and determines that a reasonable time to review organization of the agency that delivers services associated with potable water, wastewater, stormwater, solid waste and road maintenance and preservation for optimization and current statutory requirements is desirable;
- (B) That the Highland Town Council further finds and determines that The Public Works Director has communicated the desire to have someone perform the duties associated with his former position of Operations Director, as he acclimates and assumes the duties of public works director;
- (C) That the Highland Town Council still further finds and determines that Section 4.11 of the Compensation and Benefits Ordinance states in pertinent part "If a regular full time employee is assigned to temporarily replace another employee at a higher grade-level for an extended period of time, that employee will begin to receive a greater rate of pay after completing thirty (30) calendar days in that position. The actual rate will be subject to approval by the Town Council. All other benefits remain the same;
- (D) That the Highland Town Council still further finds and determines that Section 2(A) of Ordinance 1691 Fixing the Wages and Salaries of the Elected Officers, Appointed Officers and Employees expressly provides "...all new employees will start at the identified starting wage or salary for their job position unless approved by the Town Council or authorized board of jurisdiction to do otherwise;"
- Section 2. That based upon the foregoing, the Town Council does hereby authorize and approve the following:
- (A) That pursuant to its authority under IC 36-1-4-15 to fix the level of compensation of its officers and employees, as well as the authority described in the preamble to this enactment, the Public Works Director is hereby authorized:
 - (1) to promote from within the current workforce to the position of acting Operations Director; or
 - (2) to recommend to the Town Council, as the appointing authority, a person for hire to the position of *acting* Operations Director;
- (B) That pursuant to its authority under IC 36-1-4-15 to fix the level of compensation of its officers and employees, as well as the authority described in the preamble to this enactment, the relevant provisions set forth in the Ordinance No. 1378 establishing the *Compensation and Benefits for the Employees of the Town of Highland* as amended, particularly outlined in Section 4.11 of that ordinance, shall be suspended only to the extent necessary to support the promotion of a person within the municipal workforce to the position named in this enactment;
- (C) That pursuant to its authority under IC 36-1-4-15 to fix the level of compensation of its officers and employees, as well as the authority described in the preamble to this enactment, the relevant provisions set forth in the Ordinance No. 1691 establishing the Wage and Salaries for the Elected Officers, Appointed Officers and Employees of the Town of Highland as amended, particularly outlined in Section 2 (A) of that ordinance, shall be suspended only to the extent necessary to support the hiring of a person to the position named in this enactment;

(D) That pursuant to the foregoing, the person promoted or hired to the position named in this enactment shall be authorized to be paid at the rate currently fixed for the position of operations director, with a vehicle or without a vehicle, as may apply, while performing as *acting* operations director;

Section 3. That the adoption of this enactment shall in no way be construed as a precedent for the subject department or any other department of the municipality, nor shall it be construed as creating an entitlement for any other workers in any other department, but rather the provisions in this enactment are specific, unique and particularly conferred, and any provisions suspended in the Compensation and Benefits ordinance are only suspended for the specific purposes of this enactment and shall not extend beyond its particular authority;

Section 4. That authority under this enactment shall be seen as complementary to and not in derogation of the authority of the Clerk-Treasurer under IC 36-5-6-6;

Water Main Replacement & Street Improvement Project (Project); and

Whereas, NIES Engineering, Inc., a licensed engineer performing construction engineering services on this project, has specifically identified and presented Change Order No. 1, attached herewith, which details the changes and alterations to the Project which have a net increase in the total contract amount of Twenty-one Thousand Five Hundred Eleven Dollars and 25/100 Cents (\$21,511.25); and

Whereas, The increase in cost, as determined by NIES, is allocated to the Board of Works in the amount of Thirteen Thousand Fifty-five Dollars and 00/100 Cents (\$13,055.00) and to the Water Works Board in the amount of Eight Thousand Four Hundred Fifty-six Dollars and 25/100 Cents (\$8,456.25); and

Whereas, The Town of Highland, through its Board of Works, now desires to approve and authorize the Change Order as described; and

REASON FOR CHANGE:

1. During the course of water main installation, each sanitary lateral along Robertson Place was found to be constructed of multiple materials. Within the trench, each lateral was clay pipe. However, towards the curb, the clay pipe was found loosely inserted into concrete pipe that was then connected to PVC pipe. In order to avoid potential damage to the laterals during curb replacement, each lateral was replaced with PVC pipe from the house-side of the trench to the existing PVC pipe past the curb.

b. For work outside the ROW, the Works Board's portion of \$9,140.00 would be funded by a cost share agreement between the Sanitary District and the affected residents. Sanitary District Resolution 2020-16 authorizes 50% of the cost (\$4,570.00) to be paid by the Sanitary District and 50% of the cost (\$4,570.00) to be paid by and divided equally between the two property owners.

\$3,915.00 is for work within the ROW and \$9,140.00 is for work outside the ROW.

a. For work within the ROW, the Works Board's portion is \$3,915.00.

2. During the course of concrete sidewalk and driveway apron removal, a 4-inch drain pipe was found partially embedded in the sidewalk and along the driveway apron at 8212 Rosewood Court. This pipe collected storm water from the rear yards (both gravity and pumped flow) and discharged over the driveway apron and through a slot in the curb. Since capping or removing the drain pipe would cause or exacerbate drainage issues at 8211 and 8212 Rosewood Court, it was determined in consultation with the impacted residents and Town staff that extending a storm pipe from the existing storm sewer in the street to the rear yards would best facilitate proper drainage and promote health and safety.

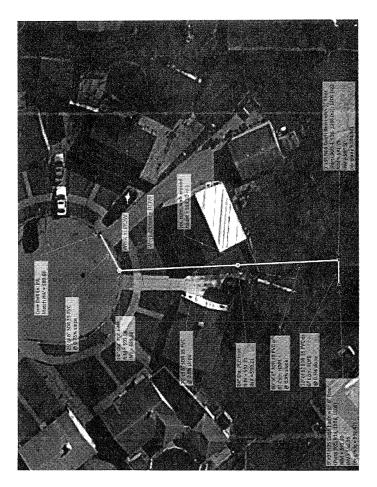

4. Colloquy and Discussion Regarding Instruction regarding the planned Special Event Scheduled September 26, 2020. Chapter 11.15 in the Highland Municipal Code establishes the Community Events Commission. HMC Section 11.15.030 sets forth the purposes of the commission. It has been determined desirable to receive advice regarding the status of the special event.

The Town Council members, John Breslin, Liz Breslin, and Jacki Herrera of the Community Events Commission discussed the status of the fall event now slated for September 26, 2020.

The discussion included an exploration of the ability to enforce the social distancing requirements, the number of vendors and crafts persons committed, and the importance of including a special provision in vendor agreements to allow for unusual intervening events such as the current pandemic.

It was determined that the matter would be further considered at the study session of the Town Council of August 17.

The subject property is currently zoned R-1A Single Family (Large Lot) Residential District and petitioner seeks rezoning to R-3 PUD Planned Unit Development District, designation.

Petitioner: SJ Highland, LLC/Russell Group, by its counsel, James L. Wieser, Wieser & Wyllie, LLP. The Municipal Plan Commission determined a **favorable recommendation**, by a vote of six (6) in favor, none opposed at its meeting July 15, 2020. The Plan Commission's *findings of fact* were memorialized from the July 15, 2020 hearing and were officially adopted at its meeting of August 19, 2020. The *matter was certified to the Town Council for its consideration and action*, received in the Office of the Town Clerk-Treasurer, August 20, 2020.

IC 36-7-4-608 (e) states that the legislative body **shall** vote on the proposal within 90 days after the plan commission certifies the proposal. Coming with a *favorable recommendation*, IC 36-7-4-608 (f) further provides that at the *first regular meeting of the legislative body after the proposal is certified or*

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at any subsequent meeting within the 90 day period, the legislative body may either adopt or reject the proposal.

Actions. Pursuant to IC 36-7-4-608 (f), having received a favorable recommendation, the Town Council may either approve the recommendation and adopt the ordinance or reject the recommendation, and defeat the ordinance. If no action occurs within 90 days, the recommendation of the Plan Commission is adopted. 90 days tolls on November 17, 2020.

Note: As an ordinance to amend the zoning code, IC 36-5-2-9.8 (b)(1) states the usual rules for considering an ordinance on the same night of introduction do **not** apply.

• Ordinance No. 1720: An Ordinance Amending the Zoning Map of the Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance Passed by the Town Council of the Town of Highland, Lake County, Indiana, on the 9th day of October 2017, by Ordinance No. 1659 and Codified as Title 18 of the Municipal Code to be Effective on the date of adoption; and hereinafter reclassifying an area in the Town of Highland, Lake County, Indiana from an R-1A Single Family Residential District to a R-3-PUD District.

ORDINANCE NO. 1720 of the TOWN OF HIGHLAND, INDIANA

That the following described property situated in the Town of Highland, Lake County, Indiana, which is presently designated as being R-1A Single Family Large Lot Residential District is hereby rezoned to rezoned to R3-PUD Residential Planned Unit Development District, which area is more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at the Northwest corner of the said West Half; thence South 89 degrees 41 minutes 54 seconds East along the North line of said West Half, 663.99 feet to the Northeast Corner of the said West Half; thence South 00 degrees 03 minutes 14 seconds East along the East line of the said West Half to a point 24.00 feet North of the Southeast Corner of the said West Half;

That the Zoning Map, which accompanies the Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance and which is part thereof, shall be amended and changed so as to include the "R-3-PUD" Planned Unit Development District on the specific parcels of the real estate hereinabove described, all of which was formerly "R-1A" Single Family Large Lot Residential District, and henceforth whose plan, regulations and rules governing the "B-PUD" General Business Planned Unit Development District shall apply to the specific parcel of real estate hereinabove described, respectively;

Section 3. That the Town Engineer is hereby ordered to make appropriate map change and that said Ordinance No. 1659 together with all amendments thereof and supplements thereto is, codified as Title 18 of the Highland Municipal Code, and the same is hereby further amended accordingly;

Section 4. That an emergency exists for the immediate taking effect of this amendment, and that the same shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and adoption.

Town Council Staff Report- September 14th Meeting

Current activities include the following: Social media posts and "Shares" by other Department's social media outlets; Census flyers being distributed through the Highland Library; and, message placement on the September water bill and an article in the September Gazebo Express.

Highland households that have not responded should self-respond immediately, if they have not already done so, by going to 2020census.gov to respond online, respond by phone by calling 844-330-2020, by mail, or with a census worker.

The deadline for responding to the Census is still officially September 30th, though last week a federal court judge in one of the many ongoing Census-related court cases ordered the Trump Administration to stop preparations to conclude on September 30th, pending a hearing next week. The crux of much of the litigation is to restore the Census Bureau's earlier deadline of October 31st.

As for Highland's self-response rate, <u>we are currently outperforming 2010 self-response rates</u> town-wide and in five of Highland's six census tracts.

As of statistics obtained yesterday (September 9th), a 2010/2020 comparison of self-response rates to date, shows as follows:

A Resolution Approving an Interlocal Cooperation Agreement between the Incorporated Town of Highland and the School Town of Highland for the Utilization of School Resource Officer Program Services

WHEREAS, Indiana Code 36-1-7-1, et seq., allows local government entities to make the most efficient use of the powers by enabling them to mutually utilize services for the mutual benefit of each other; and

WHEREAS, The Incorporated Town of Highland and the School Town of Highland, Lake County, Indiana are municipal corporations empowered by the aforesaid Interlocal Cooperation Act, as amended, with authority to contract with each other on a basis of mutual advantage so as to better provide public services and facilities at a shared cost; and

WHEREAS, The Incorporated Town of Highland and the School Town of Highland desire to enter into a joint agreement pursuant to IC 36-1-7-1, et seq., to provide for the ability and flexibility to obtain for the Highland Students certain gang resistance training, a heightened law enforcement presence in the local public schools as well as other related services for the mutual benefit of the participating entities, and at a shared cost,

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Town Council of the Town of Highland, Lake County as follows:

- **Section 1.** That a joint agreement, a copy of which is attached and incorporated herein by reference, among and between the Incorporated Town of Highland and the School Town of Highland entered into by the Town of Highland by and through its Town Council, this **24**th **Day of August 2020** is hereby authorized and approved in each and every respect;
- **Section 2.** That the purpose of this agreement is to authorize and allow the Town Council of the Town of Highland and the School Board of Trustees to act as a joint board of the two participating entities to mutually support and utilize certain specified services associated with the **School Resource Officer Program** for the mutual benefit of the participating entities at shared costs;
- **Section 3.** That the Clerk-Treasurer of the Town of Highland is hereby authorized to execute the duties related to the payment, collection and accounting for all moneys of this joint undertaking, pursuant to the terms of this agreement, in a manner that is mutually acceptable with the duly constituted and acting business official of the School Town of Highland;
- **Section 4.** That the governing boards of the participating entities may be convened as a joint board, or may act as a joint board at separate meetings of the respective governing bodies of the participating entities in which the entities concur;

- **Section 5.** That the governing boards of the participating entities may create a committee comprised of representatives from both participating entities or may designate a single individual from each of the participating entities, which may perform such administrative ministerial duties as the joint board may direct and the agreement may provide;
- **Section 6.** That the President of the Highland Town Council and the Clerk-Treasurer are hereby authorized to execute the joint Interlocal Governmental Agreement with their signatures and any additional documents in order to implement the agreement;
- **Section 7.** That this agreement shall be effective as indicated in and pursuant to its provisions, after the agreement has been authorized and approved by each of the participating entities, evidenced by passage and adoption of a similar Resolution all pursuant to I.C. 36-1-7-2;
- **Section 8.** That upon its approval, this agreement repeals the agreements governing the school resource officer program, the first adopted January 17, 1997 and its succeeding agreements;
- **Section 9.** That before this agreement takes effect, it must be recorded with the Office of the Lake County Recorder. No later than sixty (60) days after it takes effect and is recorded, the agreement must be filed with the Office of the State Board of Accounts for audit purposes, all pursuant to I.C. 36-1-7-6.

INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT

This Interlocal Governmental Agreement made and entered into in accordance with I.C. 36-1-7 by and between the TOWN OF HIGHLAND (hereinafter called "Town") and the SCHOOL TOWN OF HIGHLAND (hereinafter called "School Town"), both municipal and corporations organized and operating under the laws of the State of Indiana.

WITNESSETH THAT:

WHEREAS, The Town desires to provide a Town of Highland Police Officer to the School Town to serve in the capacity as School Resource Officer to instruct both the G.R.E.A.T. curriculum and the Officer Friendly program, and to perform other related duties.

THEREFORE, IT IS AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. The Town agrees to provide to the School Town the service of one (1) Highland police officer to serve as a School Resource Officer. The purpose of the School Resource Officer will be to minimize the potential for hate crimes/bullying, alcohol and drug-related use, gang-related activities, and disruption and/or criminal behavior in and around schools, such as theft, vandalism, truancy, etc. in the most effective and efficient manner possible. Said officer, who shall remain an employee of the Town, shall provide services as presented in a School Resource Officer Job Description, a copy of which is on file with the Town and the School Town. Said job description may be amended from time to time by a written amendment to this Agreement signed by representatives of both parties.
- 2. In consideration of the same, the School Town agrees to pay for said services in accordance with the terms of this Agreement the amount of \$79,953.36 for a period of 180 days during the 2020-2021 school year. The basis for said compensation to the Town is presented as an exhibit to this agreement incorporated herein by reference. The School Town's compensation shall be paid in two (2) equal installments, as follows:
 - (A) the first being due on or before December 31, 2020;
 - (B) the second payment being due on or before June 30, 2021.
- 3. The Clerk-Treasurer of the Town shall be authorized to execute the duties of receiving payments from the School Town as described in paragraph two (2) and of disbursing and accounting for all such monies in a manner consistent with the terms of this Agreement.
- 4. The School Resource Officer will be assigned on a full-time basis to the School Town the equivalent of up to one hundred eighty (180) days during the school year. The School Town will only be financially responsible for the equivalent number of days actually worked by the School Resource Officer.
- 5. The School Resource Officer will wear clothing that will easily identify him or her as a police officer.

- 6. The School Resource Officer will not take personal time off when school is in session. If sick, he must notify the receptionist at the School Town Administration Center. A substitute may be assigned subject to mutual approval of the Police Chief and the School Superintendent.
- 7. Lunch must be eaten in a School Town cafeteria unless prior arrangements have been made with the Superintendent/designee.
- 8. The Town will assume all costs and responsibility of initial and ongoing training associated with the School Resource Officer position. Any vehicle or additional equipment or expenses necessary for the program shall be paid for by the Town.
- 9. The Town shall be responsible for selecting the police officer to serve as the School Resource Officer, subject to the consent and approval of the School Town. The School Town has final authority on the content of all instructional materials used by the School Resource Officer.
- 10. The administration of the terms of this Agreement shall supersede any previous Agreement and shall be accomplished through the Superintendent of the School Town or designee and the Chief of Police or designee.
- 11. Any other provision of this Agreement to the contrary notwithstanding this Agreement may be changed or modified only with the written consent of both parties.
- 12. All notices or communications provided herein shall be in writing and delivered either in person or via certified or registered United States mail, return receipt requested, and with the proper postage prepaid, addressed to the party for whom such notice or communication is intended.
- 13. Should any part, term, or provision of this Agreement be determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to be illegal or in conflict with any law, the validity of the remaining portion or provisions shall not be affected thereby.
- 14. No failure or delay in performance of the executed service Agreement by either party shall be deemed to be a breach when such failure or delay is occasioned by or due to any Act of God, strike, lockout, war, riot, epidemic, explosion, sabotage, the binding order of any court or governmental authority, or any other cause, whether of the kind enumerated above or otherwise, not within the control of the party claiming suspension, actually provided that no cause or contingency shall relieve the School Town of its obligation to make payment for the services of the School Resource Officer programs actually provided by the Town.
- 15. This Interlocal Agreement may be executed in several counterparts, each of which when so executed shall be deemed to be an original, and such

counterparts, together, shall constitute but one and the same instrument, which shall be sufficiently evidenced by any such original counterpart.

16. Before this agreement takes effect, it must be recorded with the Office of the Lake County Recorder. No later than sixty (60) days after it takes effect and is recorded; the agreement must be filed with the Office of the State Board of Accounts for audit purposes, all pursuant to I. C.36-1-7-6.

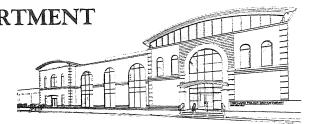

Lee,

Like I tell everyone with whom I speak of about this case...what a GREAT idea YOU had and I wish I thought of it! I can't compliment you enough on thinking outside the box in reference to his homicide investigation. From day one the family assumed that due to the victims precarious lifestyle that he was murdered...and a wide array of suspects came to light as not one of the previous investigators assigned this case was able to see the forest through the trees.

Previous investigators, driven by the family's desire to "pursue the killer", supported by both the Coroner's and Fire Marshal's report, kept pushing us in one direction. It wasn't until you were assigned the case that you "felt" something wasn't right...whereas you stepped back and with an open mind took another look at the investigation.

Cops, good cops that is...never stop being the Police. As much as this may be a personal detriment to our overall health and social family life, the "job" and therefore the public reap its benefits. Earlier this year and on your own time, you had occasion to watch a "special" on homicides. At that time you learned of a "cold case" team consisting of many both active and retired professionals with fire, law enforcement and medical backgrounds whose only job is to investigate homicides.

With approval, you submitted the Niezgoda investigation to the Cold Case Team and over the course of the next several weeks corresponded with Investigators. Having reviewed the case and its evidence in its entirety, the team surmised, in part...that there was insufficient evidence to definitely prove the manner of death but that the most probable conclusion was that this was consistent with accidental death".

Subsequent correspondence with all investigative parties involved ultimately led to a meeting in mid-July whereas both the Highland Police and Fire Department, the Indiana State Fire Marshal's Office and the Lake County Coroner's Office in consideration of their own individual findings and input from the Cold Case Team, concluded that the case should be reclassified from homicide to accidental death.

We hope with this new finding that the family can finally have some rest as they have attempted to search for a suspect these last fifteen years.

Had it not been for your due diligence this case would have remained an unsolved homicide thus leaving the victims elderly parents, sibling, and now adult son left with emptiness in their hearts that someone purposely took his life. I hope this can bring closure.

Lee, for outstanding work on this investigation, the Highland Metropolitan Board of Police Commissioners commends you for a job well done!
