MERKLEY STUDENT WINS NATIONAL POSTER CONTEST

JOHNSTON HONOR PARKWAY

Nearly a dozen trees donated and planted last year at Johnston Elementary are giving north Highland more than shade. The saplings are providing funds needed to augment playground equipment that will be used by the Johnston Elementary community.

Principal Amy Harrington said the goal is to raise an estimated \$5,000 for specialty structures – such as a gravity swing pictured above – that provide joy and play opportunities for children of all abilities.

"Our Johnston outdoor space is used by so many members of our community," Harrington said. "We envision our Honor Tree Parkway being a place where current students can honor and remember members of our community who have made this a great place to live, work and play."

The fundraiser allows the community to adopt each of the 11 trees. Every donation will be made in honor of an individual or family that will be recognized with plaques placed adjacent to the adopted trees.

By mid-March, four of the 11 trees had already been adopted. Harrington said an event is planned for late spring to recognize all that has been accomplished through the generosity of others.
