NO KID HUNGRY GRANT

The School Town of Highland received more than \$48,000 in grant funding to feed kids during the coronavirus pandemic.

The grant will be used to expand free meal service during the summer months, purchase a refrigerated truck to transport food and launch new programs – such as Second Chance Breakfast and After School Snack – during the 2021-2022 school year.

"This school year looks different than any we've seen before, but one thing remains the same: kids rely on us not just for their education, but also for nutritious meals," Food Service Director Lisa Hayes said. "This grant from No Kid Hungry will help ensure that we can continue to provide our students with the nutrition they need to learn, while also helping our families."

FREE SUMMER MEALS

This year, for the first time, we will be offering free daily summer meals to anyone in our community ages 18 and younger.

The Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) is a federally funded program that ensures access to healthy meals when students are not in school. The program is open to any child and is not based on income or need. The middle school program kicks off June 1. All other sites begin June 7. We will also be teaming up with Highland Community Partners and alternate weekly curbside "Fun Days" at Johnston and Merkley Elementary. Stay tuned!

MERKLEY WEB DESIGN CONTEST

When Technical Resource Assistant Lucas Maciejewski saw how eagerly his Merkley Elementary students played games online and searched the internet that someone else built, he created a contest, sparking interest for them to build their own.

Cooperation from Education Director Nora Kasprycki and her tech team meant adding an HTML editor application to all Merkley iPads and a new world opened to students who were able to write computer code and see what it would look like in real time.

SUMMER REMEDIATION

American Recovery Act funds and willing educators are giving students in grades K-5 the opportunity to put COVID learning gaps behind them. Enrollment will be determined by principal and teacher recommendations. Space will be limited in order to maintain a 1:10 teacher to student ratio.

Curriculum Director Ryan Erdelac said plans for an expanded summer remediation program is designed to help children who fell behind during the pandemic to augment their skills to grade level – and beyond.

"Students have suffered disparities in learning through no fault of their own," Erdelac said. "We are preparing an 18- to 20-day curriculum that clicks with students and rebuilds their confidence."
