#### HIGH SCHOOL CREDIT RECOVERY

Credit Recovery assistance for seniors was so popular, High School Principal John Zack said a decision was made to open it up to all high school students lacking credits to graduate.

"This summer course gives any students who is credit deficient the opportunity to make it up," Zack said. "Lacking grade-appropriate credits without a remediation plan is a compounding problem, which many students try to deal with the last few weeks of their senior year. It just doesn't work that way."

In addition to English and Algebra I, students who need help in science, advanced math, history, government or economics will receive teacher assistance to master that class.

#### FRESHMAN ORIENTATION

Incoming freshmen and students new to the high school in the 2021-2022 school year are invited to attend orientation between July 26-July 29. Students will get RDS access, tours of the building, introductions to staff and mentor students along with information key to student success.
