WARREN STUDENTS PROGRAMMING ROBOTS

One year into partial implementation of the elementary Project Lead The Way curriculum, Warren Principal Christina Davis said it has already become a favorite for students at every grade level. This year, students will be utilizing all four curriculum modules as they develop problem-solving skills and program Vex robots to perform specific tasks. If it doesn't work the first time, teams of students continue working to perfect the concept and coding until it does. In addition to academic achievement, Davis said students experience the success of achieving their goals and learning to work as part of a team - one module at a time. "All students K-5 participate in Project Lead the Way - and they love it. It's hands-on learning that students can relate to," Davis said. "With each progressive year, the tasks become increasingly complex. Beginning with the kindergarten Tiger projects, students use everything they've learned to advance their skills and build successes that span the entire curriculum."

These are skills that translate seamlessly from the classroom to the boardroom.
