Let's make it count, Highland!

As the Sept. 30 deadline rapidly approaches, census workers are visiting Highland households that have not responded.

Highland has the 21st highest selfresponse rate out of Indiana's 566 cities and towns.

"To date, we are outperforming the 2010 self-response rate townwide," said Lance Ryskamp, co-chair of Highland's Complete Count Committee. "But that is only 81 percent of Highland's households. We need to finish strong to ensure Highland receives its fair share of billions of dollars in resources."

For those who have not already done so, please take 10 minutes to respond. "Those 10 minutes equal 10 years of benefit to the Town of Highland," Ryskamp said.

[RESPOND NOW]

Residents still have three ways to self-respond before Sept. 30 census deadline:

- Respond online at my2020census.gov.
- 2. Call (844) 330-2020.
- 3. Fill out and mail in paper questionnaire.

[IN-PERSON VISITS]

Census workers carry a valid government ID with photo, a U.S. Department of Commerce watermark and expiration date.

[MASK MANDATE]

The mask mandate also continues through September 25. Gov. Eric Holcomb issued a state mandate that anyone living in or visiting Indiana – ages 8 and older – must wear a mask in public. Face coverings for children ages 2 -7 are strongly recommended.

If you are not wearing a mask, and a store or restaurant says it requires customers to wear face coverings, they can refuse to let you shop or eat in their establishment.

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[DOWNTOWN PARKING LOT UPDATE]

After breaking ground in August, the Redevelopment Commission's downtown project to rebuild and enhance the municipal parking lot at the southwest corner of Kennedy and Highway is proceeding on time – and budget.

"We are excited to see this project come to life," Redevelopment Director Kathy DeGuilio-Fox said. "When completed later this fall, it will include not only the repaving of the parking lot, but stamped paving that will provide a walkway through the lot, new lighting, rain garden landscaping, a bike trail that runs along the perimeter of the parking lot and a public restroom facility we are calling The Depot. Infrastructure for electrical vehicle charging stations is also part of the project." Fall festivals and events canceled amid pandemic

The 2020 Makers Market, Fall Festival and Fire Department Open House have all been canceled due to COVID-19.

Consideration is ongoing to determine whether other events this fall and winter will also need to be scrapped.

Town Council President Mark Schocke said balancing the desire to host events that are value-added for residents against the public health provided no other choice.

"Town leaders along with the Council of Community Events had high hopes the numbers of those with the virus would continue to decline, but that hasn't been the case," he said. "Statewide daily positive cases had been in the mid-300s in May. Today, the number of new cases often exceeds 1,000 per day."

Schocke is looking ahead to next year.

"2020 has been a difficult year, tougher than any of us could have imagined," he said.

"Our community has been good about wearing masks and social distancing. Adhering to these precautions now will mean we can get past this and enjoy 2021 as a community."

[CONTACT TRACING]

If you receive a call or a text from the Indiana State Department of Health, please respond. Contact tracing identifies those who may have come into contact with an infected person and slows the spread of COVID-19 by:

- Helping those who may have been exposed to get tested
- Asking people to self-isolate if they have COVID-19 or quarantine if they are a close contact

[ELECTION 2020]

Secretary of State Connie Lawson has recommendations for Hoosiers who want to make sure their ballot is counted for the Nov. 3 election:

- Don't procrastinate: Those looking to cast a mail-in ballot should apply now. The last date to request a mail-in ballot is Oct.
 22. Only ballots received by noon on Election Day will be counted.
- Take advantage of early inperson voting beginning Oct. 6.
