# Highland's population the highest in 40 years

Highland's official 2020 census reveals the town added more than 200 new residents, turning the tide on population declines that began in the 1980s and 1990s. Beyond drawing new boundaries for voting districts and the potential to bolster funds for road projects, the census means so much more. It offers a snapshot of Highland today and a glimpse of what tomorrow may offer.



### [ CENSUS RESPONSE ]

When Lance Ryskamp became cochair of the town's Complete Count Committee, he and co-chair Erin Stojic dove headfirst into spearheading a count of every man, woman and child who called Highland home in 2020.

"We put together a good plan, but COVID changed everything. Fortunately, this was the first Census to allow online response," Ryskamp said. "Our self-response rates, with the exception of one census tract, exceeded 2010 levels and was the 20th best in the state."

Today and in the months to come, town leaders will drill down on important benchmarks, such as:

- Employment: 11,740 have jobs, 1.4 percent more than in 2019.
- Wages: Rose \$2,984 year over year, a gain of 4.62 percent.
- Poverty: Dropped nearly 4 percent since 2019.

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# Snow rules help keep Highland streets safe

When snow and ice are in the forecast, Highland Public Works shifts into high gear – first with the road application of brine that is followed by salt. Plows pick up where salting ends.

Public Works Director Mark Knesek said residents can help by getting their vehicles off the street.

"When we're out plowing, parked cars impede our ability to clear streets," Knesek said. "They inconvenience neighbors and make for dangerous conditions when slush and snow freeze around vehicles.

"It's not about when you're going to get a ticket for on-street parking during adverse weather," he said. "It makes sense to protect your well-being as well as that of your vehicle and help us do our jobs by moving cars in advance of winter precipitation."



### [ SNOW PARKING BAN ]

Highland Police Chief Pete Hojnicki is reminding residents to move vehicles off all streets when measurable snowfall is predicted. The Council increased the threshold for tickets and fines to 2 inches of snow.

"The ordinance was created to keep our police, fire and EMS workers along with our school bus drivers and the students they are carrying safe," Hojnicki said. "We are all in this together. The best thing we can all do is follow the rules and be good neighbors."

# Mild weather extends leaf, branch collection

Public Works crews have begun what they hope will be their last cycle of retrieving nature's bounty of leaves – starting **December 6** with Zone 1 and concluding **December 17** with Zone 10.

Additional crews will continue that work through the remainder of the year beginning on the north side.

Public Works Director Mark Knesek said additional collection days should remedy the problem of leaves falling six weeks later than normal.

"By the beginning of January, we plan to begin branch collection and chipping, weather permitting," Knesek said. "I want to thank residents—in advance—for pitching in to accommodate what has been a very unusual year."

### [ BRANCH COLLECTION ]

Small amounts of twigs and branches that are cut into small, manageable pieces can be disposed in your trash can. Larger amounts of branches can be placed in piles in front of your home for collection.

### [ CHRISTMAS TREES ]

Wondering what to do with that live fir after the tinsel, ornaments and lights have been packed away? You have two options: Haul it yourself to Main Square Park or, simply leave it at the curb and let Public Works haul it to Main Square for you. Either way works and stokes the fires for the beloved Twelfth Night Celebration – the tradition of burning discarded Christmas trees – on January 6.

### [ ANIMAL LICENSE RENEWAL ]

All dogs and cats that call Highland home need a license. Registering is a one-step process that begins and ends at the Clerk-Treasurer's Office, 3333 Ridge Road. Forms require contact information as well as pet name, breed, sex, color, spay/neuter and vet. All pets must be up-to-date on their rabies vaccination. The owner will then be given a registration tag the pet is required to wear. Each year the town reunites several pets and their owners through the license program. ### [ BUSINESS LICENSE RENEWAL ]
