MINUTES OF THE REGULAR PUBLIC METTING BOARD OF SANITARY COMMISSIONERS TUESDAY DECEMBER 21, 2021

The Board of Sanitary Commissioners of the Sanitary District of Highland convened in a study session immediately before the Regular Public Meeting at 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday December 21, 2021 with Commissioner Garcia presiding, in the meeting room of the Highland Municipal Building, 3333 Ridge Road, Highland, Indiana, in order to discuss the final agenda of the regular meeting.

Silent Roll Call: Commissioners Laura Corpus-acting secretary, Rex Burton, Richard Garcia. Greg Cieslak attended via ZOOM. David Jones-absent. Also present were Mark Knesek, Public Works Director, Tim Gembala, Public Works, Derek Snyder of NIES Engineering, Inc. and Mark Herak, Town Councilman.

Mr. Knesek commented on the illegal discharge of grease products into our sewer system. He stated that every time a court date is arriving the offender's state they will comply. However, nothing is being done. He suggested no more continuances. Mr. Garcia stated it has been agreed no more continuances.

Mr. Garcia stated that nothing is new with the written agreement with HSD.

Mr. Snyder had no updates on current projects at this time.

HIGHLAND DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SANITATION and SANITARY DISTRICT BOARD OF SANITARY COMMISSIONERS RESOLUTION NO. 2021-16

A Resolution Affirming Net Revenue Protocol for the Sewage Enterprise Funds, Fixing and Establishing Amounts to be the Operating Reserve for the Sewage Works Operating and Maintenance Fund and Fixing a Reserve Balance for the Sewage Works Improvement Fund.

Whereas, The Highland Town Board of Trustees, as legislative body of the municipality, enacted Ordinance No. 586, July 21, 1969, establishing the Board of Sanitary Commissioners and the Department of Public Sanitation, pursuant to provisions of I.C. 36-9-25-1 through 36-9-25-40 as amended;

Whereas, Indiana Code Title 36, Article 9, chapter 25, section 6 provides that the Board of Sanitary Commissioners may adopt the rules it considers necessary to conduct its meetings and business and to control and manage the property under its jurisdiction;

Whereas, Indiana Code Title 36, Article 9, chapter 25, section 10 (16) further provides that the Board of Sanitary Commissioners may adopt resolutions, rules and bylaws that are necessary to carry out this chapter, including repealing or amending them consistent with this chapter;

Whereas, IC 36-9-25-34, provides that all revenues derived from fees and charges, shall be deposited, held and used as provided in IC 36-9-25-32, except for set-asides as provided in IC 36-9-25-29;

Whereas, The Board of Sanitary Commissioners now wishes to make further provisions, setting forth the net revenue method of fund allocation for proceeds generated from rates and charges which it believes are necessary to carry-out the purposes of Sanitary District Law;

- Whereas, from time to time new circumstances and exigencies emerge, that in the interest of operating efficiencies and sound management, do urge the need to revise and fix a new operating balance figure for the Operating and Maintenance Fund as well as fix a reserve balance for the Improvement Fund; and,
- Whereas, The Board of Sanitary Commissioners now wishes to act in the interest of operating efficiency and sound management practice to revise and fix a new operating balance for the Sewage Works Operating and Maintenance Fund as well as fix a reserve balance for the Sewage Improvement Fund,

BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED BY the Board of Sanitary Commissioners of the Department of Public Sanitation and its Sanitary District of Highland, Lake County, Indiana, as follows:

Section 1. That the Board of Sanitary Commissioners finds and determines the following:

- (A) That the reserve balance of the Sewage *Operating and Maintenance Fund* be hereby fixed at its current operating reserve amount of \$700,000 which represents a **desirable** reserve level;
- (B) That the reserve balance of the **Sewage Improvement Fund** be hereby fixed to a new recommended reserve amount of \$900,000, increased from \$800,000, which represents a desirable balance to support the utility's expected capital improvements and extensions;
- (C) That these reserve balances herein described be effective beginning from the **month of January 2022**, continuing thereafter until such action by the Board modifies it;

Net Revenue Protocol

- **Section 2.** That the net revenues collected from rates and charges of the Department of Public Sanitation and Sewage Works shall be deposited to the credit to the funds herein described according to the following convention:
 - (A) There shall be credited to the Sewage works **Operating and Maintenance Fund** as of the last day of each calendar month a sufficient amount of revenues from rates and charges so that the reserve balance in the fund shall be sufficient to pay the expenses of operation, repair and maintenance for the then next succeeding two (2) calendar months or sixty (60) days as fixed, in the amount described and set forth in Section 1 (A) of this resolution.
 - (B) Any balance in the *Operating and Maintenance Fund* in excess of the expected expenses of operation, repair and maintenance for the then next succeeding two (2) calendar months or sixty (60) days, if applicable, may be transferred to the *Improvement Fund*, as the Board may direct, so that the reserve balance in the fund shall be sufficient to pay the expenses of improvements, replacements and extensions, for the then next succeeding twelve (12) calendar months as fixed, in the amount described and set forth in Section 1 (B) of this resolution;

(C) Any excess revenues remaining after meeting the requirements of the *Operating and Maintenance Fund* and any requirements of the *Improvement Fund*, shall be deemed "surplus earnings", and may be transferred and deposited to the credit of the Sewage works *Cash Reserve Fund*, established in Section 3.20.060 of the Highland Municipal Code;

Section 3. The Board of Sanitary Commissioners acknowledges the provisions of IC 8-1.5-3-11 (d), adopted by reference in Section 3.20.060, which provide that the legislative body may include in the municipal general fund budget, as revenue in lieu of taxes, an amount equal to the actual balance in the cash reserve fund as of June 30 of the current year. However, the available cash reserve fund balance may be transferred to the municipal general fund only during the calendar year for which the budget was adopted, and transfers may not be made from any utility funds to the general fund except from the cash reserve fund;

Section 4. The Board of Sanitary Commissioners further acknowledges the added provisions, which provides that if at any time after the final approval of the budget an emergency should arise for further appropriations from the general fund, the legislative body may, by ordinance, transfer additional money from the cash reserve fund to the general fund to provide for the additional appropriations, the transfer to be limited to the accretions to the cash reserve fund since the preceding June 30;

Section 5. That Board of Sanitary Commissioners authorizes and instructs the municipal fiscal officer to take such steps to carry out the purposes of this resolution;

Section 6. That all prior policies in conflict with this resolution are repealed and this resolution shall remain in full force and effect until is repeal or revision by subsequent action of the Board.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING AND ESTABLISHING A DISCRETE RESTRICTED BALANCE IN THE SEWAGE WORKS CASH RESERVE FUND of the SANITARY DISTRICT of HIGHLAND, LAKE COUNTY, INDIANA

Whereas, The Highland Town Board of Trustees, as legislative body of the municipality, enacted Ordinance No. 586, July 21, 1969, establishing the Board of Sanitary Commissioners and the Department of Public Sanitation, pursuant to provisions of I.C. 36-9-25-1 through 36-9-25-40 as amended;

Whereas, Indiana Code Title 36, Article 9, chapter 25, section 6 provides that the Board of Sanitary Commissioners may adopt the rules it considers necessary to conduct its meetings and business and to control and manage the property under its jurisdiction;

Whereas, Indiana Code Title 36, Article 9, chapter 25, section 10 (16) further provides that the Board of Sanitary Commissioners may adopt resolutions, rules and bylaws that are necessary to carry out this chapter, including repealing or amending them consistent with IC 36-9-25;

Whereas, IC 36-9-25-34, provides that all revenues derived from fees and charges, shall be deposited, held and used as provided in IC 36-9-25-32, except for set-asides as provided in IC 36-9-25-29; and,

Whereas, The Board of Sanitary Commissioners now wishes to make further provisions, setting forth and identifying a discrete reserve balance to be part of the surplus proceeds on deposit to the credit of the Sewage Cash Reserve Fund, which it believes are necessary to better carry-out the purposes of Sanitary District Law,

BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED BY the Board of Sanitary Commissioners of the Sanitary District of Highland, Lake County, Indiana, as follows:

Section 1. That the net revenues collected from rates and charges of the Department of Public Sanitation and Sewage Works shall continue to deposited to the credit to the funds as described in the relevant resolution of the Board of Sanitary Commissioners setting forth the proper new revenue protocol and convention;

Section 2. That as authorized in the resolution described in section 1, any excess revenues remaining after meeting the requirements of the Operating and Maintenance Fund and any requirements of the Improvement Fund, shall continue to be deemed "surplus earnings", and shall be transferred and deposited to the credit of the Sewage works Cash Reserve Fund, established in Section 3.20.060 of the Highland Municipal Code, provided as follows:

- (a) That the rates and charges adopted by the Board of Sanitary Commissioners and approved by the Town Council at its meeting of December 28, 2020 to be effective on February 1, 2021, were designed to include a component that would generate sufficient revenues each month to support an annual payment in the amount of \$218,407 to be made to the City of Hammond Department of Public Sanitation and Sanitary District in satisfaction of the provisions of an Interim Letter Agreement between the Hammond Department of Public Sanitation and Sanitary District and the Highland Department of Public Sanitation and Sanitary District;
- (b) That the cash resources on deposit to the Sewage works Cash Reserve Fund shall be further set aside into a special *restricted* balance to be used and to be applied to the payments described in the previous subdivision, to be discretely depicted in the total resources on deposit to the credit of the Sewage works Cash Reserve Fund, with the balance on deposit to the credit of the fund to be "surplus earnings;"
- (c) That the restricted balance shall be composed by a monthly deposited amount sufficient to accrete the amount of proceeds to support an annual contribution for payment in the amount of \$218,407 as described herein;
- (d) That the restricted balance shall not be drawn down or used for any other purpose than for the objects and purposes for which the restricted balance was authorized, unless the Board of Sanitary Commissioners directs otherwise by proper action;

Section 3. That resources on deposit to the credit of this fund may be expended only upon warrants drawn by the municipal fiscal officer upon vouchers of the Board of Sanitary Commissioners;, and only for the lawful purposes of the Sewage works Cash Reserve Fund and the further limited purposes of the restricted balance;

Section 4. That Board of Sanitary Commissioners authorizes and instructs the municipal fiscal officer to take such steps to carry out the purposes of this resolution.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING AND APPROVING A CHANGE ORDER TO THE CONSTRUCTION CONTRACT WITH INSITUFORM TECHNOLOGIES USA, LLC, FOR THE 2021 CURED-IN-PLACE PIPE LINING OF SANITARY SEWERS PROJECT

Whereas, The Sanitary District of Highland is governed by its Board of Sanitary Commissioners, pursuant to the provisions of IC 36-9-25 et seq.; and

Whereas, IC 36-9-25-9 specifically provides that the Board of Sanitary Commissioners shall manage and control all works of the district and may purchase, acquire, construct, reconstruct, operate, repair and maintain all sewage works; and

Whereas, The Board of Sanitary Commissioners in performing its duties, may adopt resolutions, rules and by-laws that are necessary to carry out the provisions of IC 36-9-25 including repealing or amending them consistent with the Sanitary District Law; and

Whereas, The Sanitary District of Highland (District), through its Board of Sanitary Commissioners, had heretofore on January 19, 2021, adopted Resolution No. 2021-03, A Resolution, Offering, Authorizing and Approving an Extension to the Contract for the Annual Service Agreement 1 to Insituform Technologies USA, LLC (Insituform) for Cured-In-Place Pipe (CIPP) Lining of Sanitary Sewers through December 31, 2021; and

Whereas, The District had determined to commit funding annually to rehabilitate the sanitary sewer collection system through CIPP lining in order to correct structural issues and reduce the impact of storm water infiltration into the sanitary sewer system as identified by the RedZone Robotics, Incorporated (RedZone) YES Program; and

Whereas, NIES Engineering, Incorporated (NIES) had compiled a list of sanitary sewers to be lined in 2021, based on preliminary results from Phase Two (81st Street Basin) of the RedZone YES Project, with an aggregated itemized cost in the amount of Nine Hundred Ninety-nine Thousand Nine Hundred Thirty-seven Dollars and 50/100 Cents (\$999,937.50) and issued a Purchase Order, in said amount, to Insituform to complete the work; and

Whereas, during the course of construction of the Project, it has become necessary to change or alter the original specifications and/or item quantities of the project; and

Whereas, NIES Engineering, Inc., a licensed engineer performing construction engineering services on the Project, has specifically identified and presented Change Order No. 1, attached herewith, which details the changes and alterations to the Project which have a net decrease in the contract amount of Four Thousand Eight Hundred Thirteen Dollars and 75/100 Cents (\$4,813.75); and

Whereas, The Sanitary District of Highland, through its Board of Sanitary Commissioners, now desires to approve and authorize the Change Order as described.

Now, Therefore Be it Resolved by the Board of Sanitary Commissioners for the Sanitary District of Highland, Lake County, Indiana, as follows:

Section 1. That Change Order No. 1 to the construction contract between Insituform Technologies USA, LLC and the Sanitary District of Highland for the 2021 CIPP Lining of Sanitary Sewers Project, as prepared by NIES Engineering, Inc., a licensed professional engineer performing construction engineering services on the Project, is hereby approved and authorized in each and every respect;

Section 2. That Change Order No. 1 decreases the original contract amount by Four Thousand Eight Hundred Thirteen Dollars and 75/100 Cents (\$4,813.75), bringing the total value of the contract to Nine Hundred Ninety-five Thousand One Hundred Twenty-three Dollars and 75/100 Cents (\$995,123.75);

Section 3. That Change Order No. 1 extends the date for substantial completion by 58 calendar days to December 31, 2021;

Section 4. That the President of the Sanitary District of Highland be authorized to execute the Change Order with his signature;

A JOINT RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF WORKS, THE WATER WORKS BOARD OF DIRECTORS, AND THE SANITARY BOARD APPROVING AND AUTHORIZING CHANGE ORDER NO. 1 TO THE CONSTRUCTION CONTRACT BETWEEN THE HIGHLAND BOARD OF WORKS AND DYER CONSTRUCTION CO., INC. FOR THE 3500 BLOCK OF JEWETT AVENUE WATER MAIN REPLACEMENT AND STREET IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

Whereas, The Town of Highland, through its Town Council, which is the Works Board of the Municipality pursuant to I.C. 36-1-2-24(3), has determined that a need exists to make certain public improvements and repairs to roadway infrastructure on the 3500 Block of Jewett Avenue including the replacement of defective curb and sidewalk, pavement, and tree removal and replacement and have hereto approved a project to be described as the 3500 Block of Jewett Avenue Water Main Replacement & Street Improvement Project (Project); and

Whereas, the Water Works District of Highland (WW District) is governed by its Board of Water Works Directors, pursuant to the provisions of IC 8-1.5-4 et seq.; and

Whereas, IC 8-1.5-4-4 specifically provides that the Board of Water Works Directors shall manage and control all works of the Water Works and may purchase, acquire, construct, reconstruct, operate, repair and maintain all water works; and

Whereas, The WW District, through its Board of Directors, has determine the need to replace and upsize the existing water lines within the Project boundaries, as described herein, in order to improve water flow and water quality; has determined that it would be in the best interest of the utility to coordinate the work with the Project; and have agreed to fund its share of the construction costs and engineering services necessary to complete the work; and

Whereas, The Sanitary District of Highland (SD District) is governed by its Board of Sanitary Commissioners, pursuant to the provisions of IC 36-9-25 et seq.; and

Whereas, IC 36-9-25-9 specifically provides that the Board of Sanitary Commissioners shall manage and control all works of the district and may purchase, acquire, construct, reconstruct, operate, repair and maintain all sewage works; and

Whereas, The Project scope includes the repair and replacement of certain storm water facilities, which are the responsibility of SD District and have agreed to fund its share of the construction costs and engineering services necessary to complete the work; and

Whereas, On August 30, 2021, Town Council through its Board of Works, adopted Order of the Works Board 2021-30, on August 26, 2021, the Water Works District adopted Joint Resolution No. 2021-22 and on August 17, 2021, the Sanitary Board adopted Joint Resolution No. 2021-13, awarding a Project to Dyer Construction Co., Incorporated in the total amount of Five Hundred Sixty-eight Thousand Six Hundred Fifty-eight Dollars and 00/100 (\$568,658.00), to be the lowest responsive and responsible bid; and

Whereas, during the course of construction of the Project, it has become necessary to change or alter the original specifications of the project and/or to increase or decrease the planned material quantities; and

Whereas, NIES Engineering, Inc., a licensed engineer performing construction engineering services on this project, has specifically identified and presented Change Order No. 1, attached herewith, which details the changes and alterations to the Project which have a net decrease in the total contract amount of Twenty-two Thousand Nine Hundred Sixty-three Dollars and 01/100 Cents (\$22,963.01); and

Whereas, the decrease in cost, as determined by NIES, is allocated to the Board of Works in the amount of Six Thousand Eight Hundred Thirty-one Dollars and 79/100 Cents (\$6,831.79), to the Water Works Board in the amount of Eleven Thousand Nine Hundred Eighty Dollars and 48/100 Cents (\$11,980.48), and to the Sanitary Board in the amount of Four Thousand One Hundred Fifty Dollars and 74/100 Cents (\$4,150.74); and

Whereas, The Town of Highland, through its Board of Works, now desires to approve and authorize the Change Order as described; and

Whereas, The Water Works District of Highland, through its Board of Directors, now desires to approve and authorize the Change Order as described; and

Whereas, The Sanitary District of Highland, through its Sanitary Board of Commissioners, now desires to approve and authorize the Change Order as described; and

Now Therefore Be it Resolved by the Board of Works for the Town of Highland, the Board of Directors of the Highland Water Works, and the Board of Commissioners of the Highland Sanitary District as follows:

Section 1. That the First Addendum to the Construction Contract with Dyer Construction Co., Incorporated for the 3500 Block of Jewett Avenue Water Main Replacement & Street Improvement Project, as prepared by NIES Engineering, Incorporated, a licensed engineer performing construction engineering services on this Project, is hereby determined to be directly related to the original project and is hereby approved, adopted, and ratified in each and every respect;

A RESOLUTION FOR THE AMENDMENT OF SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT FEES ASSOCIATED WITH THE SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT PROGRAM IN THE TOWN OF HIGHLAND, ALL PURSUANT TO IC 36-9-25 ET SEQ.

- Whereas, The Sanitary District of Highland is governed by its Board of Sanitary Commissioners (Board), pursuant to the provisions of IC 36-9-25 et seq.; and
- Whereas, IC 36-9-25-9 specifically provides that the Board shall collect and remove garbage, ashes, and other waste materials to prevent the pollution of watercourses within the district and to protect the public health; and
- Whereas, IC 36-9-25-10(13) further provides that the Board may collect and remove, or contract for the collection and removal of, all garbage, ashes, dead animals, refuse, and wastes from domestic premises, and construct or have constructed stations, including barns, garages, sheds, blacksmith shops, dumps, incinerators, and all other useful or necessary improvements for this purpose

and adopt resolutions, rules, and bylaws that are necessary to carry out the provisions of IC 36-9-25, including repealing or amending them consistent with Sanitary District Law; and

- Whereas, IC 36-9-25-11 provides that the Board may fix fees for the for the treatment and disposal of sewage and other waste discharged into the sewerage system, collect the fees, and establish and enforce rules governing the furnishing of and payment for sewage treatment and disposal service; and
- Whereas, The Board provides for other solid waste management services for the citizens of the Town of Highland and realizes other certain costs associated with the administration and management of the solid waste collection and disposal services provided; and
- Whereas, It has been determined that the Solid Waste Management Fees Schedule needs to be amended in order to assure that the fees collected for services are just and equitable owing to the changes in the Solid Waste Management program.
- **Now, Therefore Be it Resolved** by the Board of Sanitary Commissioners of the Sanitary District of the Town of Highland, Indiana, that the following provisions and associated rates and charges for the disposal of sewage and other waste discharged into the sewerage system, including solid waste, be approved subject to IC 36-9-25-11(c):
 - Section 1. That Section 12.15.130 under Chapter 12.15 of the Highland Municipal Code be hereby deleted and repealed and be hereby amended by inserting the following replacement Section 12.15.130 under Chapter 12.15, which shall read as follows:

Section 12.15.130 Procedures and fees for disposal of refuse

- (A) Permitted Uses. The disposal of compactable refuse by residents of the town shall be permitted in accordance with this section. **The Town of Highland Garage dump site** is only intended for a small amount of household waste on an occasional basis.
- (B) Prohibited Uses.
 - (1) It shall be an offense for commercial dumping or disposal of refuse by commercial vendors or any contractors.
 - (2) Further, n Non-residents of the town are prohibited under penalty from disposing of refuse at the Highland public works facility.
- (3) No resident is allowed to dump construction materials. If debris is from a contracted job, it must be taken to a landfill for disposal, at the resident's expense. Residents remodeling their homes are considered contractors.
- (C) Permit and Fees.
 - (1) Any person dumping refuse at the Highland public works facility shall first secure a "dumping permit" from the public works office. The permit shall identify the name, address, and phone number of the permittee; vehicle type and license number; description of the refuse to be disposed; and disposal fee. Dumping refuse without a valid permit is prohibited; said permit shall be presented to the dumpster attendant prior to dumping refuse, and the dumpster attendant shall verify that the permit is proper for the refuse being disposed. **Only single axle trailers shall be allowed to dump. Double axle trailers are prohibited.**
 - (2) Fees for the disposal of residential refuse by residents of the town of Highland served by the department of public sanitation shall be collected by the public works office according to the following schedule:
 - (a) Compactor Rate. Construction and demolition debris; e-Extra trash (less than four feet in length):
 - 1. Pickup truck, van, suv or one-ton dump truck, single axle trailer (full): \$10.00 15.00.
 - 2. Pickup truck, van, suv or one-ton dump truck, single axle trailer (1/2 full or less): \$10.00
 - 23. Minimum fee (car load): \$5.00.

(b) Open Container Rate. Extra trash; construction and demolition debris (over four feet in length):
1. Pickup truck, van, suv or one-ton dump truck, single axle trailer: \$20.00 25.00.
2. Furniture, appliances, mattresses, and the like (each piece): \$5.00.
(c) Tree Branch Disposal. No charge (office check-in required).
(d) Concrete, up to one cubic yard: \$5.00. \$10.00 minimum charge and \$25.00 per cubic yard. (Standard full size pickup = 1 cubic
yard, 1-ton dump truck and single axle trailer = 2 cubic yards).
D) Concrete. Disposal of concrete at the Highland public works facility is limited to no more than one two cubic yards.
E) Hours. The Highland public works facility shall be available for the disposal of refuse in accordance with the provisions of this chapter from
Monday through Saturday Friday from the hours of 8:30 8:00 a.m. through 3:30 p.m. and on Saturday from the hours of 8:00am through 3:30
o.m. from March through December. Dumping shall not be available on Saturday from January through February.
F) Temporary Fee Waiver by Order of the Board of Sanitary Commissioners President. Whenever an intense weather or other natural event has occurred which has unduly caused or created an unusual and involuntary increase in the volume of trash or debris experienced by residents of the town, he board of sanitary commissioners hereby authorizes that the board of sanitary commissioners president, when in his opinion the public good would require it, may issue a written order, directed to the public works director and the clerk-treasurer, indicating that for the foregoing reasons set forth in his chapter, the fees set forth in the schedule under this section for refuse services at the public works facility are waived for residents, with such vaiver to be for a time certain and not to exceed a period of three weeks. Further, such order should be reported to the board of sanitary commissioners for its information in a timely manner.
Section 2. That pursuant to IC 36-9-25-11(c), the fees and charges imposed by the passage and adoption of this resolution shall become and be effective upon all users whose property is within the district, upon approval by ordinance passed and approved by the municipal legislative body, which is the Highland Town Council;
Section 3. That the Secretary of the Board of Sanitary Commissioners is hereby directed to forward a copy of this resolution to the office of the clerk treasurer as clerk of the legislative body, with a request that the Town Council of the Town of Highland, take up the matter for consideration and action at its earliest opportunity.
