### School improvements ahead

#### The \$4 million bond will:

- » Add new surface to high school tennis courts
- » Resurface parking lots
- » Expand high school tech for Project Lead the Way

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Superintendent Brian Smith said — with the notable exceptions of upgrades for the 10 prep tennis courts and equipment purchase to provide more opportunities for the wildly popular science and engineering curriculum — the balance of projects on this

summer's \$4 million to-do list will be primarily maintenance.

School officials believe the impact on property tax bills will be minimal, thanks to a concerted effort by the district in recent years to pay down outstanding debt that funded — among other improvements — new, safe entrances at the town's six public schools.

"This winter has been hard on all asphalt surfaces and that includes parking lots and entrance drives at School Town of Highland buildings," Smith said. "It's actually a perfect time to do this sort of work because they were due for maintenance."



### Senior class creates memorial scholarship honoring Tyler Scheidt

As the class of 2022 counts down to their graduation, Senior Class President Connor Raab said he and his nearly 250 classmates have decided their parting gift to the school children of Highland will be a legacy scholarship in the name – and memory – of Tyler Scheidt (pictured right).

The 2019 Highland graduate died after being hit by a car in August. The high school standout in academics, sports and being an all-around beloved friend to all was preparing to enter his junior year at Wabash College.

"Tyler impacted the community so greatly in his life," Raab said. "It seems fitting that future classes will be impacted through his memory."

The Senior Class envisions the Tyler Scheidt Memorial Scholarship as a \$500 award given annually to a deserving Highland graduating senior.

Class representatives are working with Superintendent Brian Smith to finalize the details on what qualifications should be applied to applications, who could serve on the scholarship committee and perpetual sources of funding.

"The senior class will fund the first scholarship which will be awarded to a 2023 graduating senior," Raab said. "I have spoken with Athletic Director Ryan Harrington, who has committed \$250 annually from ticket sales to help fund the scholarship going forward."

### Free summer meal program will be offered in-person at school cafeterias, town locations

The summer meal program for children 18 and younger is a go!

Food Service Administrator Lisa Hayes said the School Town is operating under a plan that designates sites where meals will be served each weekday.

"It is still possible that the USDA will extend waivers to make it easier to access meals curbside or where children do not have to be present, but we won't know the final details for a few more weeks," Hayes said. "No matter what the final options are, the STOH food service department hopes all of our families will again take advantage of free meals

during the summer. Highland Parks continues to be an important partner and with their assistance, we will be able to set up a site at Main Square Park as well as provide meals at Lincoln center for their summer camp program."

Meals are also planned at Merkley and Johnston elementary schools. Additional sites may be added yet this spring.

## Blindness doesn't stop Highland High cross-country runner from competing

When Garrett Lewis watched his older brother, Ethan, train and compete in cross-country, it seemed only natural he would follow in his footsteps – literally.

From the Highland Invitational to its New Prairie counterpart, the brothers competed in the region's signature events – in separate years but with the same goal.

Garrett, now a high school junior, said it never occurred to either of them that running at high speeds when they couldn't see the course was beyond their reach.

The brothers have the same genetic mutation that results in severe vision impairment or blindness, known as Leber Congenital Amaurosis.

"I recognize that I have a disease

that impairs my vision," he said. "That doesn't stop me from trying."

To make the magic happen, Lewis trains with teammates. During meets, he has a guide runner.

"My line of vision is off, which makes it so I see better from the periphery," he explained. "When I transition from shade to light, they call out the routes, which has been awesome."

The family mantra of trying extends to ax-throwing and archery, martial arts where he is a probationary black belt and playing the drums.

"Staying active and in-themoment has been great," he said. "Throughout my life, my parents, teachers in academics, sports and extra-curriculars have always believed there was nothing I couldn't do. I believe that, too."

#### **STATE QUALIFIERS**

Congratulations to seniors Logan Opilka and Jesse Herrera, who will go down in the record books as state qualifiers in their respective sports.

After just three years in the pool, Opilka, a captain on the Highland team, qualified for the IHSAA diving state finals, where he finished 29th on the one-meter board.

Herrera, who finished his prep wrestling career with 119 wins and 33 losses, had a standout senior year posting 33 wins and just three losses in the 170-pound weight class. His performance at state made him one of the top 16 wrestlers in his weight class in Indiana this year.

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
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
