HIGHLAND ACCEPTING OUT-OF-DISTRICT STUDENTS

For the first time in Highland school history, the School Board has voted to open its borders to Indiana students who reside outside the district.

Within a week of the vote — and with no advertising — more than 180 parents had already signed their child up to attend a public school in Highland beginning in August. The out-of-district openings include a high of 40 incoming kindergarten and first-grade students to a low of 10 students each in grades 4-8.

Superintendent Brian Smith said the district has slated no openings for high school juniors or seniors based on concerns over the shortened time frame to help incoming students obtain enough credits to graduate on time.

"Because this is our first time, we wanted to get acclimated to this new program and see if there are tweaks that need to be made before adding components," Smith said. "We are excited to see the level of interest we have in kindergarten through grade 10."

In all, the district has room for 240 students. If all available spots are filled, the district will receive an additional \$1.3 million from the state for the upcoming school year, enough to ease – but not erase – the budget shortfall.

REGISTRATION

Out-of-district student registration continues through noon June 22.

To register, parents and guardians should visit highland.k12.in.us and click on the out-of-district registration button to get the process started.

STEP 1

Parents/guardians will click the google form link to enter their student's necessary information.

STEP 2

Upon completing the google registration form, parents will click a calendar link to schedule an in-person meeting with the district registrar and produce all required documentation.

NOTIFICATION

The School Town of Highland has limited openings in grades K-10.

Parents will be notified no later than June 27 of their students' status.

If there are more applications than spots available, a lottery drawing will be held June 29 at central office and parents notified.

Free summer meal program offered in-person at Highland elementary school cafeterias

The School Town of Highland will again serve healthy breakfasts and lunches this summer as part of the USDA's Summer Food Service Program.

The free program provides nutritionally sound meals to more than 5 million children each summer. During the 2021 fiscal year, the program provided 3 billion meals at a cost of \$10.7 billion to children nationwide.

Johnston, Merkley and Southridge elementary schools will serve as nutrition sites this summer in Highland.

Food Service Administrator Britni Luster is excited about the meal offerings this summer.

"It's a great way to ensure your children are receiving nutritionally sound meals," she said. "Our goal is to feed as many school-age kids as possible, maintaining the continuity of regular meals we established during the school year. Last summer we served 5,211 meals to our community."
