ENHANCING OUR ENVIRONMENT

The community garden next to Fire Station #1 is flourishing. The movement of water into and out of the Heron Rookery has dramatically improved its desirability for nesting herons, egrets, ducks and owls. Around Highland, greening initiatives abound. Here's the latest news:




[BIKE PATH RESTORATION]

With an assist of a \$5,000 NIPSCO environmental grant and \$875 from U.S. Fish and Wildlife, the town is moving forward to restore a wetland pollinator prairie on 1.9 acres within the utility right-of-way between 81st Street and Grand Avenue. The pollinator prairie straddles the bike path nearest the Little Calumet River. Councilman Bernie Zemen said that, in addition to flooding that breeds mosquitoes, the land has long been a headache for the Parks Department to mow when rains turn the dry soil into mud. Parks will maintain the newly planted prairie for the next two years. "This is a great idea come to life," Zemen said. "Once the plants are established, the pollinator prairie will require no maintenance."

[DRIVING WISE]

Drive Clean Indiana came to town in June to film a video promoting Highland's sustainability efforts. From the new LED fixtures that light up the downtown while conserving energy to the electric car charging stations, the town is getting a reputation as a community working to reduce its carbon footprint.



[DOWNTOWN RAIN GARDEN]

Highland Neighbors for Sustainability have completed the rain garden at the Municipal Complex between Town Hall and the Highland Police Station. The self-sustaining rain garden is filled with native plants designed to absorb rainwater runoff.

[MANAGING INVASIVE PLANTS]

Highland Neighbors for Sustainability is sponsoring an education talk at 6:30 p.m. August 2 at the Highland Library. Specialist Mandi Glanz will talk about why invasive plants are a problem and how to identify and manage them. Interested? Please register at the library.

The town is welcoming four new officers to the department. Officer Kyle Rhein joined the department May 8. Officers Zachary Buss, Christopher Wanat and Tristan Baker were sworn in June 12. The four officers were presented their badges by Chief Ralph Potesta and Police Commissioner Danny Stombaugh. "These officers will be a great asset to ongoing crime-fighting efforts in our community," Potesta said. "They bring talent and skillsets for police work that will enhance what we are doing to keep crime rates low and advance public safety in Highland."

After graduating from Fishers High School in 2019, Probationary Officer Tristan Baker, 22, attended Purdue University Northwest, where he graduated in May with a Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice. While a university senior, he completed his college internship with the Highland Police Department. Baker will attend the Northwest Indiana Law Enforcement Academy in Hobart, which begins July 31.


