[FALL CLEANUP DAY]

If getting rid of excess stuff has been on your to-do list, let the purging begin. Republic Waste Services will schedule extra crews Tuesday, October 10 to collect additional trash and unwanted items as part of fall cleanup day. Construction debris, concrete, household hazardous waste, paint, pool chemicals and leaves are NOT included.

[DRUG TAKE BACK]

Turn in unused or expired medications to the authorities instead of flushing or throwing them out. No needles are accepted. Highland Police will be participating with the Drug Enforcement Agency as a drop-off site for medications from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday, October 28. The **Highland Police Department** is located at 3315 Ridge Road. Please note: All medications will be incinerated by the DEA. so you do not have to remove labels. QUESTIONS? [NO BURNING LEAVES]

Open burning of leaves, twigs or other yard waste is prohibited within the corporate limits of the Town of Highland. According to Title 12.15.050 of the Highland Municipal Code, "No person shall openly burn or ignite refuse, garbage or rubbish." The law was created to keep residents and structures safe.

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Region restaurateur to carry on traditions

A month after Traditions Restaurant sustained significant damage in a fire believed to have started in a bathroom fan, owner Ruben Ibarra is waiting on a report from a structural engineer to determine next steps.

"My wife, Tania, and I are hearing it might be six months or a little longer to repair the damage," he said. "I want to thank the entire Highland community for supporting us when we took over and supporting us now." It was the people of Highland who regaled Ibarra with anecdotes about what they loved about the restaurant and stories of how they grew up dining at the eatery that convinced him to extend the history of Traditions.

"It was our plan to open another El Mariachi, like the one we have owned and operated in Calumet City for the last 29 years," he said. "After talking with customers, we decided to keep the menu the way they like it."

Highland proposes \$19.75 million budget – an additional \$500,000 for local roads

The Town Council gave a preliminary thumbs up on a spending plan for 2024 that includes money for employee raises, health insurance increases and buffers to ensure there are funds to pay the day-to-day costs of running the town, including necessities, such as gas, diesel fuel, road salt and utilities.

After several years of modest increases in employee health insurance, Clerk-Treasurer Mark Herak said the town will pay 8.2 percent more next year, about the same increase as in 2023.

The budget also includes \$500,000 earmarked for Local Roads and Streets funds that can be used for Indiana's Community Crossing

WHAT'S NEXT?

The proposed 2024 civil town budget is \$19.75 million. Of that, a maximum of \$11.3 million will come from property taxes paid by residents, businesses and industry. The budget is slated for adoption at 6:30 p.m. October 23.

program. Matched dollar-for-dollar, the town funds set aside will buy \$1 million in street construction next year.

Public Works Director Mark Knesek lobbied for the council to reconsider a wheel tax, a proposal President Tom Black and Councilwoman Toya Smith said was a non-starter because of the impact it would have on residents.


