CARDINAL BOUTIQUE HOTEL COMING THIS SPRING

A boutique hotel planned for the Cardinal Campus development at Main Street and Prairie Avenue has gotten the thumbs up by the state Building Commission. Next up will be the desk of town Building Commissioner Ken Mika.

The vision of Claude Gendreau, DVM, the hotel is planned for spring construction and will cater to families who bring their dogs and cats from locations across the country to have orthopedic surgery and post-surgical rehab.

Project Manager Jodi Kennedy said, "The Cardinal Hotel will support the lodging needs of individuals visiting the area as well as surrounding businesses and events in the Northwest Indiana community."

ABOUT THE HOTEL

The three-story luxury hotel is estimated to cost \$18 million and will include 35 guest rooms and luxury suites – and feature conference rooms, a coffee shop, bar and light dining.

WHAT'S NEXT?

The project will be reviewed by the Highland Building Department and Plan Commission to gain the necessary approvals to begin construction.

[COMMERCIAL PROPERTY IMPROVEMENT GRANT]



From the moment NWI Parkinson's bought the building at 2927 Jewett Street nine years ago, Director Elizabeth Woodbury has worked and prayed for money to help pay for a new sign and capital improvements. "We have more than 200 people who come here for classes and programs throughout the week that are geared for individuals with Parkinson's Disease. It is vital for all of us with Parkinson's to keep moving," said Woodbury, who was diagnosed 20 years ago. It was the Highland Redevelopment Commission that came to the rescue, providing a first-ever grant to a Highland not-for-profit. NWI Parkinson's paid about \$8,000 while Highland Redevelopment contributed \$3,290 to the project. "I love the new sign. The new heating and air conditioning units are invaluable," she said. Highland police sporting beards to raise money for Northwest Indiana Cancer Kids

Highland police are forgoing close shaves in November to help the NICK Foundation raise money for local children with cancer. This marks the third year donations from Highland residents will go to NICK, which provides assistance to families and supports charities searching for a cure.

November 2023 marks the eighth year the town Fraternal Order of Police have participated in "No Shave November." During that time, officer participation and the generosity of Highland residents have helped raise more than \$20,000 for charity. "We normally get half the department to grow beards," Sgt. Shawn Anderson said. "Those who can't grow one typically donate. It's a great cause."


