[VIPS CANDIDATES]

It's a volunteer position that comes with perks – training, a uniform and becoming part of the town's public safety network. Being a VIPS member also offers an opportunity to have fun and make new friends.

VIPs assist police officers by providing a variety of tasks, including: vacation home checks, assisting at community events, traffic patrols in residential/ business/park districts, funeral escorts, fingerprinting, filing, typing, even answering telephones.

Tasks and assignments vary. All hours and shifts are available.

[CROSSING GUARDS]

Highland Police are seeking individuals at least 18 years old to dedicate about an hour twice a day to provide safe crossing for Highland schoolchildren.

"We need those who would like to fill in at one of the six crossing locations when the regular crossing guards are not available," Cmdr. John Banasiak said. "We rest easier because our crossing guards are watching out for our kids."

HIGHLAND FIRE DEPARTMENT EAGERLY AWAITS NEW CLASS OF 2024 RECRUITS

Under the leadership of Chief Mike Pipta, the Highland Fire Department has sent its first class of recruits for 2024 to the academy for six months of training at the Multi-Agency Academic Cooperative in Valparaiso.

"We were impressed with our trainees during interviews and are eager for them to graduate and become part of the department," Pipta said. "Collin Hatfield, Kevin Martinez, Zachary Myers, Amy Ryan and Nick Steele will be a great asset to our town."

Having satellite locations for fire/first responder training, which includes

the MAAC site in Northwest Indiana, has been a welcome change for firefighters-in-training.

Highland recruits began five months of online and in-person classes January 4. Training includes state certifications in Hazardous Material Awareness/Operations, Firefighter I/ II and all state required curriculum to function as a firefighter in the state of Indiana.
