FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

New FAFSA form expands eligibility for federal student aid, including Pell Grants

Changes at both the federal and state level over financial assistance for college is causing confusion for students – and their parents.

Highland High School Principal John Zack said they've scheduled a FAFSA Night to explain the U.S. Department of Education rule changes for the Free Application for Federal Student Aid. Changes include a new formula that estimates how much a family can afford and eliminates the break for families who have multiple children in college at the same time.

The situation was made more confusing for Indiana seniors who must complete the FAFSA application or opt out to graduate.

Coupled with a delay in providing the new rules and forms, which are typically posted by Oct. 31, the process has become a source of frustration and anxiety for parents.

Wrestling phenom Aleksandra Bastaic pinned herself to the short list of elite female wrestlers when she brought home the Indiana High School Girls Wrestling Championship in her weight class — her second title in two years at the state level. And, she's only a sophomore.


Her wrestling career began in first grade with a call-out for elementary students who wanted to learn to wrestle.

"I tried it on a whim," she said.
"Weirdly, I fell in love with this
all-contact sport and never looked
back. It's been all-wrestling –
first with the boys because there
weren't many girls in the sport.

For now, I wrestle competitively with both boys and girls until girls wrestling is sanctioned by the IHSAA."

Bastaic sees her future through the lens of her sport. She wrestles year-round at meets around the country, working hard on the physical – and mental – aspects of the sport.

"My plan is to wrestle in college," she said. "I see myself pursuing a career in sports medicine – but it's still early. I have more to accomplish while I'm still in high school."

ITEMS FOR REGISTRATION:


1. Five proofs of residency

Two of the following: NIPSCO, water, phone, cable (utility bills/deposit receipts)

Two of the following: Driver's license/state ID showing current address, vehicle registration, recent paycheck/unemployment check receipt.

One of the following: Lease and rent receipt, mortgage and homeowners insurance documents, notarized letter with three proofs of residency from the homeowner (parent/guardian must provide ID listed above)

- 2. Proof of custody, if applicable
- 3. Birth certificate
- 4. Social security number
- Current immunization records (name and phone number of pediatrician)
