Exciting upgrades on tap for Parks and Rec

The Highland Parks and Recreation Board has a host of projects on tap to enhance safety, upgrade facilities making them ADA accessible and expand recreation space at Sheppard Park. Park Superintendent Alex Brown said the board uses available funds and grants to their fullest while maximizing the construction season to keep moving the parks forward.

[ADA CONCESSIONS]

By the end of construction season, the six park-based concession stands will be ADA accessible.

The concession at Meadows has already been retrofitted to make it wheelchair accessible.

While there may be other modifications to concessions at Main Square, Sharp Athletic Complex, Homestead, Markley and Sheppard parks, **Superintendent Alex Brown** said the focus is on accessibility at the service windows.

[NEW HAWK SIGNAL ON KENNEDY AVENUE]

A Hawk signal is expected to go out to bid this year with installation to follow in 2025 on Kennedy Avenue where it intersects with the bike path. The signal is unique in its responsiveness to pedestrian and bicycle traffic crossing the heavily traveled Kennedy Avenue. Unlike most traffic signals, the Hawk operates only when a pedestrian pushes the crossing button. It is Highland's second signal. The first was installed at 45th Avenue and the bike path.

Parks Superintendent Alex Brown said the downtown crossing on Kennedy is considered the most dangerous in the local trail system. As a result, the Indiana Department of Transportation will be paying 90 percent of the cost.

[SOCCER FIELDS AT SHEPPARD PARK]

The 2.5 acres of fallow land contiguous to Sheppard Park is being surveyed for wetland issues in anticipation of adding soccer fields

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Parkway Drive project nears completion

Highland has substantially completed a construction project providing street, water main and storm sewer improvements along the 8600-8800 blocks of Parkway Drive and the 2000 block of Kenilworth Avenue.

This project was a joint effort of the Highland Water Works Board, Town Council and Sanitary Board, with 50 percent grant funding from INDOT and a \$250,000 grant from Lake County.

The new 8-inch water main was installed under the sidewalk along the east side of Parkway Drive, replacing a failing 4-inch asbestos pipe. The size was increased to improve water quality and additional hydrants were installed to improve fire protection.

"This is a great example of what teamwork can accomplish," Public Works Director Mark Knesek said. "Later this spring, trees will be planted to complete the project."

[BRANTWOOD PARK]

Councilman George Georgeff is losing patience with NIPSCO, which he says is dragging its feet and threatening the footprint of nearby Brantwood Park.

"The utility is not being a good neighbor to Highland," he said. "Highland wants to install new playground equipment and resurface the tennis courts at this park. NIPSCO is delaying us at every turn and now working to dramatically reduce the size of the park. NIPSCO is impacting our community in a negative way."

Georgeff said he's not giving up.

"This park is a priority for the Brantwood community and I will continue working to keep our park the focal point it has been for the community for the last 60 years."

Bookmaker says Highland hottest place to buy homes

Six months after Crain's Chicago Business reported Highland was the sixth hottest housing market in the country, WISH-TV in Indianapolis is reporting our town is considered the first when it comes to hottest places to buy homes in Indiana and 29th in the nation. Griffith and Dyer were listed as second and third – respectively.

BuyOhio.com performed similar comparisons for the other 49 states using realtor.com data.

Redevelopment Director Maria Becerra said the spotlight is good for the town.

"It's nice to know others are taking notice," said Becerra. "We are ideally situated – close to Chicago, great jobs, a national park and beaches. Highland is a fabulous community with great housing at every price range. Prospective buyers can buy a starter home, upgrade if their families grow and retire without ever leaving the community they call home."
