The immersive curriculum by Indiana University Health provided engaging lessons that married STEM to the Indianapolis 500 auto race. "We enrolled in the curriculum that included lessons for math, science, social studies and language arts," Biggs said. "From there, we were given the opportunity to apply for a mobile trip to our school. Southridge Elementary was lucky enough to be chosen for a visit in March."

In all, 75 Southridge students participated in six stations – Indy

500 numbers, Careers, Flags, Indy 500 Gear as well as History, and Traditions. They learned about the science of a real Indy car from 1980.

"This was a day we will remember," Biggs said. "We couldn't have done this without the help of our parent volunteers and my 4th-grade team, which included Andrea Scardine, Miranda Porter and Patricia Bernal."

Highland wrestling phenom named national champ!



Highland High School transitioning to modified block schedule next year

Principal John Zack said a new high school schedule will be implemented in August that guarantees students will have classroom instruction with each of their teachers three days a week.

Zack envisions the new scheduling module as students having the best of both worlds.

Block scheduling is favored for longer class sessions and more learning minutes while reducing the time spent traveling between classes and on non-education functions, such as taking attendance and handing out papers. Modifying the schedule one day a week will mean shorter sessions and interaction with every teacher three days a week. In August, the school week will typically begin with shorter sessions on Mondays with blue days following on Tuesdays and Thursdays and gold days occurring on Wednesdays and Fridays.

The modified system accommodates the needs of students who spend a portion of their day at the Area Career Center. Teachers and students will provide ongoing feedback on what they see as the advantages and disadvantages of the new system.

"We will be addressing needs as we experiment with the new system and see if it works for us," he said. "What I see as a major benefit is the frequency of interactions between students and their teachers."

PICTURE PERFECT


We'll take photos and rehearse for graduation from 4-5:45 p.m. June 4 in the auditorium, gymnasium and cafeteria.
